The Ontario Beekeepers' Association has issued a report on the estimated light honey crop for 1922. The estimate for 30,061 colonies of bees is 2,355,286 lbs. of honey. Lambton, with 1,528 colonies and a yield of 144,530 pounds of honey, ranks second among all the counties in Ontario, Wellington, with a yield of 176,000 pounds being first.

At a meeting of the Dresden school board on Friday evening last it was decided that the board should at once advertise for three teachers for the Dresden continuation school. Mr. R. D. Marwick, who has been principal for the year 1921-22, has asked for a raise above the regular schedule and the board has refused to grant it and are advertising for a new principal and two assistant teachers.

It is being planned to turn Peache Island in Lake St. Clair into a Canadian public park. The island is owned by the Detroit and Windsor Ferry Company and is situated less than one-quarter of a mile from the Canadian mainland, a short distance above Belle Isle.

The death occurred Friday of Abram Warren, of the sixth line of Plympton. Deceased had been in very poor health for some time. He is survived by his widow and two daughters, Misses Edna and Flossie both at home.

The Plympton voters' list for 1922 contains a total of 1072 names. Voters qualified to vote at both provincial and municipal elections 937, and those entitled to vote at municipal elections only numbered 135.
