PROPOSED TAPS TANKER ROUTE—GOVERNMENT POLICY RESPECTING STRAIT OF GEORGIA—FORMAL EXPRESSION TO UNITED STATES OF OPPOSITION

Mr. R. Gordon L. Fairweather (Fundy-Royal): Mr. Speaker, I will try the Acting Prime Minister on government policy. Was the minister responsible for the environment speaking for himself or was he enunciating government policy when he recently said it will be necessary to "prevent oil companies coming into the Strait of Georgia?" If so, is the Secretary of State for External Affairs going to express Canada's formal opposition to the TAPS route at his meeting in Washington on June 10?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Yes, Mr. Speaker. I join with the Minister of Fisheries, who will be responsible for the environment, in saying that our particular concern about the movement of oil down the Pacific coast relates to those narrow waters of the Strait of Juan de Fuca and the Strait of Georgia. This is the area about which we have the most concern and on which we will be making the strongest representations to the United States government.

Hon. D. S. Harkness (Calgary Centre): I would like to ask the Acting Prime Minister or the minister who will be in charge of the environment if this means that they are going to stop the present oil tankers carrying oil to the city of Victoria?

Hon. Jack Davis (Minister of Fisheries and Forestry): Mr. Speaker, I am not aware of tankers taking crude oil to the city of Victoria. There are no refineries there.
