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BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

DISPOSITION OF BILLS C-93 AND C-110

Hon. Ray Hnatyshyn (President of the Privy Council): Mr. Speaker, there have been consultations between the Parties with respect to the business for the remainder of the day. The agreement arrived at between the Parties will involve unanimous consent of the House.

We want to deal with two Bills today. The first one is Bill C-93 respecting the Sechelt Indian Band. This matter was reported from the committee yesterday but there is a disposition, by unanimous consent, to deal with the Bill now at report stage and third reading. I simply ask you to get confirmation from the opposition Parties as to that understanding.

Mr. Keith Penner (Cochrane—Superior): Mr. Speaker, for this Party, we have had discussions about Bill C-93, the Sechelt Indian self-government Bill, and we are quite prepared to give consent that this Bill move toward final reading this afternoon.

Mr. Ian Deans (Hamilton Mountain): Mr. Speaker, I understood that we were going to deal with two matters and would deal with both before the House rises at 6.25 p.m. However, I do seek from all Members of the House agreement that we try to share the time reasonably in order that those who want to speak to either or both Bills will have the opportunity to do so and still complete the business.

Mr. Hnatyshyn: Mr. Speaker, I simply want to confirm the understanding that we will seek an equitable sharing of time.

I should mention that the second Bill we want to deal with, even though it was introduced only today, is the Bill introduced by my colleague, the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (Mr. Crombie), with respect to the settlement with the Grassy Narrows Indian Band.

Mr. Penner: Mr. Speaker, with respect to the second matter, we see this as an agreement that has been negotiated between the Indian people of Islington and Grassy Narrows, and Parliament is, in fact, validating it. We are prepared to go through all stages this afternoon and see that Bill passed.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

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SECHELT INDIAN BAND SELF-GOVERNMENT ACT

MEASURE TO ENACT

The House proceeded to the consideration of Bill C-93, an Act relating to self-government for the Sechelt Indian Band (Title changed from An Act relating to the establishment of self-government for the Sechelt Indian Band), as reported (with amendments) from the Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development.

Hon. David Crombie (Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development) moved that the Bill be concurred in.

Motion agreed to.

Mr. Crombie moved that the Bill be read the third time and passed.
