PRESENTATION OF FIFTEENTH REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr. John Gormley (The Battlefords—Meadow Lake): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to its order of reference dated January 29, the Standing Committee on Communications and Culture has considered the report of the Task Force on Broadcasting Policy and has the honour of presenting its fifteenth report to the House in both official languages.

This unanimous report presents the committee's findings and recommendations on a comprehensive range of broadcasting policy issues, including public and private radio and television, the distribution of broadcasting signals and such matters as the ownership of broadcasting undertakings and copyright issues in broadcasting. The report emphasizes that the broadcasting system must address the needs and interests of all regions of Canada, of French and English speaking Canadians, and of native Canadians and other groups in society. Our report stresses the importance of Canadian programming and makes recommendations for measures that are designed to encourage more and better choices for Canadians. This report builds on the committee's earlier fifth and sixth reports which dealt primarily with the legislative provisions for a new Broadcasting Act.

On behalf of the members of our committee, I wish to thank all of our witnesses for their contributions. In preparing this report, the committee held hearings in 18 cities across Canada, received 234 oral presentations and 170 briefs.
