The Education Committee discussed at some length the question of whether such a head of department should be full-time or part-time, and would draw the attention of the Faculty to the fact that the great teachers and leaders in medicine in Europe have been part-time men, and that such experiments as have been carried out on this Continent in the appointment of full-time men, have not fulfilled the promises expected.

In the report of March 17th, 1920, referred to, the matter of the part-time man was advocated.

Your Committee would also draw attention to the fact that in our negotiathons with the Rockefeller representatives the recommendations of the Faculty were for a single head for the various clinical departments and expressed their fullest approval of the plan and stated that they would await developments along these lines with great interest. The Faculty therefore is now under obligation to the Rockefeller Foundation to carry out this plan.

The Committee therefore recommend that the Faculty immediately make effective their devision and appoint one head in all the clinical branches so as to fine keep faith with the Rockefeller Foundation.
