Field peas is broad-cast; but the advantages of the row culture in a crop so early committed to the ground, must be obvious. In Kent, where immense quantities of peas are raised, both for gathering green and for selling ripe to the seedsmen, they are generally sown in rows from 18 inches to 3 feet asunder, according to the kind, and well cultivated between. Peas laid a foot below the surface will vegetate; but the most approved depth is 6 inches in light soil, and 4 inches in clay soil; for which reason they ought to be sown under furrow when the ploughing is delayed till spring. Of all grain, beans excepted, they are in the least danger of being buried too deep. When peas are sowed thin, the plants will lie on the ground, and perhaps rot; when they are thick, the plants will hold each other up with their tendrils, forming a continued web, and will have more benefit of the air.
