

Bishop of Toronto Sends Out Pastoral Letter Appealing for Help.

The Bishop of Toronto has sent out to his clergy a pastoral letter with regard to a communication from the archbishops both of the old country and Canada, urging that an appeal be made on Sunday next (holy innocents' day), for contributions in aid of the amine stricken areas in the Near East, and especially for children.
