## 10,000 BIKES IN LINE.

A Monster Parade of Wheels in New York City, Given Up by The Herald People, for Prize.

New York, June 6.—The monster bicycle parade, which was given up by The Evening Telegram, was held this afternoon, and was an immense success. The weather was perfect. The plan of the parade was the route extending from 98th street to 104th street, and down over the same route. The parade went four abreast, and there was a distance of six feet between the bikes. The judges of the parade were Chauncey M. Dwyer, Jefferson Seligman, Edward Bell, Gen. Horace Porter and James B. Townsend. Police Commissioner Avery D. Andrews, who was to have been one of the judges, was not present. Many of the riders were fancy costume and were loudly cheered. The prizes will be awarded on Monday, when the judges will make known their decision, and The Evening Telegram will award the prizes. There were 10,000 bicycles in line, and over 100,000 spectators witnessed the display.
