Sir Mackenzie Bowell Would Rather See Them Prohibited Altogether-

Ottawa Sept. 25 .- (Special) - Senator McDonald of Prince Edward Island failed in his efforts to modify the clause in the railway bill relating to passes so as to make the issuing of passes to nembers of parliament optional, intead of compulsory. He moved his mendment in the Upper House to day. Sir Mackenzie Bowell seconded the notion. He said he did not believe that the votes of members of parliament are affected by passes, and he felt certain that passes should not be made com-pulsory. He would rather see them prohibited. The amendment was lost, whereupon Sir Mackenzle moved to ex-empt members of the Senate from the operation of the clause. This motion was also lost.

McMullen and Bowell. Senator Watson tried to restore the clause affecting stray cattle on the highways to the form in which it left highways to the form in which it left the Commons. He pointed out that every possible precaution against deliberate action which would enable cattle to get on the track, and to protect the farmer, the company and the traveling public, had been taken elsewhere in the act. The precautions were savere, but in such cases they could not be too severe. Sir Mackenzle Eowell dipiected that the proposed clause made the onus of proof of negligence on the railway companies. A man might turn out his old horse and then sue the company. Senator Watson contended that this was fully provided against. son contended that this was fully ploy vided against.

Senator McMullen characterized the clause as a very drastic one. He be-Meved the clause left the company open to attempts at imposition such as Sir Mackenzie Bowell has indicated, It was xtreme legislation and he would not ote for it. The motion was lost on a ote of 26 to 19.


