DEATH WAS HIS BRIDE.

Two Hours After His Wedding Seymour Cotton Passed Away.

Berlin, Oct. 22.—Seymour Cotton, a young Englishman, 25 years of age, died at Sheffield, Waterloo county, Monday, two hours after he had been married to Miss Lizzie Studman, his sweetheart.

Until two days before his marriage he had been in the best of health. He had been to Rockton Park with his fiancée and both were looking forward to the wedding. Cotton had made his home for some years with Mrs. Studman, the mother of the bride. Last Friday he complained of feeling ill, and a physician was summoned, who told him that he was suffering from appendicitis. On Saturday he was worse, and Miss Studman decided that if he was to die she would like him to pass into the great beyond as her husband. A minister—Rev. Mr. Culp—was sent for, and on Saturday evening at 6 o'clock the dying man and the weeping girl vowed to love each other until death parted them, in two hours the final parting took place.

Two Galt physicians arrived a short while after the marriage to perform an operation, but the bridegroom was too weak for such a measure. He passed away in the arms of his newly wedded wife about 8 o'clock.

Miss Studman was very much distressed throughout the district and the funeral was very largely attended.

HEARD ON THE MARKET.

Wheat and Pork Prices Cause Considerable Comment Among Farmers.

There was a fairly good market this morning of all commodities excepting grain. The rise in the price of wheat all over the world in the past few days has had a tendency to prompt farmers to hold back their grain and wait for a further advance. This practice often follows an advance in prices, but as there was a drop on Chicago Exchange yesterday, the local buyers expect to see a great influx of both wheat and oats. Farmers today were anxiously inquiring of buyers the latest quotations. The price offered this morning was \$1.30 for choice No. 1 and \$1.25 for No. 2. There were only a few loads—not enough to influence the market either way. In some sections of the country a report was circulated yesterday that wheat had taken a jump of 2c per bushel, but this was, however, entirely without foundation. While the fine weather conditions there will likely be little grain brought in.

The pork market, too, is receiving no little attention by the farmers. Some pork dealers were interviewed and questioned today regarding pork, which sold at \$5.25 to \$5.50. One or two expressed the opinion that it would not exceed this price at any time during the season, while others thought it would be \$5.50 to \$5.75 before the winter is over. Mr. Park said he had not heard of any scarcity of pork in the other day, and at his thought would be higher than at present. Farmers were too busy now to kill hogs, as the weather was very fine, and they were paying more attention to plowing and seeding
