Dreyfus Views the Future With Bright Eyes.

Surprised at the Machinations of His Enemies.

Article 10 of the Russian Proposal Changed at the Peace Conference.

The Pacific Cable Scheme About De cided Upon - Forty-Four Persons Killed by an Explosion at Odessa.

London, July 5 .- A Paris dispatch says: Matthew Dreyfus paid his first visit to his brother yesterday afternoon, the interview lasting half an hour. The brothers threw themselves into each other's arms. Matthew said he found his brother aged and broken in health, but not the physical wreck he feared. In spite of his sufferings, Dreyfus' eyes are as bright and his mind as clear and his intelligence as keen as when he was occupied with his duties in the general staff. He was troubled with insomnia during voyage, but has now recovered. He is

still under medical treatment.

Matthew found his brother in spirits and buoyed up by the necessity of mustering all his strength for the coming ordeal and by the hope that at last he will have justice done him. He is extremely reserved as to his life on Devil's Island, which remains in his memory as a horrible nightmare. He declares his brain is almost reeling, in the face of the mass of documents and explanations MM. Demange and Labori are bringing out regarding the extra-ordinary mechinations of his enemies and the persevering devotion of his

friends. WATCHED INCESSANTLY. Capt. Dreyfus was unable fo talk freely with his brother owing to the presence of the officer, who is under instructions to be present at all interviews between the prisoner and the members of his family. This arrangement has been a horrible trial for Madame Dreyfus and the rest, as they have been obliged to restrain emotions as far as possible, and have been unable to converse as to intimate matters, because every word has been overheard and every gesture watched by the officer. Only Maitres Demange and Labori

are allowed to see Dreyfus privately. FOR A LONG VACATION. In the French Chamber of Deputies M. Paul Beauregard, Republican, representing one of the districts of the Seine, submitted his promised interpellation on the subject of the bill dealing with workmen's wages and the hours of labor. He disputed the right of M. Millerand (Socialist), minister of commerce, to deal with the matter by decree, as he proposed to do until

the next session. M. Millerand disclaimed all intentions upon the part of the government to curtail the rights of parliament. Other deputies desired to debate the matter, but the premier declined to consent to this, and the chamber upheld him by 338 to 186 votes. The house then adjourned for a long va-

ARBITRATION ONLY OPTIONAL. At a meeting of the arbitration comnittee of the conference at The Hague the question whether arbitration should be obligatory or optional was raised, and drew a categorical declaration from the German delegate to the effect that he had received formal instructions not to accept the principal of obligatory arbitration, otherwise than by special conventions. In view of this statement article 10 of the Russian proposal was struck out and replaced by a provision declaring that arbitration should be optional except in case of conventions between the powers. "Hunger soon stalked among us," continued Jorgenson, "and have not even a faint idea what that means among a gang of hopeless men, desperate in the extreme. A dozen of my party died in thirty days, and we then began to draw lots for healthy human flesh. There are only four or five of us alive, but all too weak to travel, excepting Martin, who will try to mail this letter and obtain relief. But I suppose the letter will be too late."

### MAMMOTH COAL DEAL.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 5 .- One of the largest coal deals ever made along the Monongahela River has just been closed at Uniontown. The deal involves about \$1,200,000 cash and 10,000 acres of coal, extending from Rice's Landing to Big Whitely Creek, Greene county. The property has a river frontage of 18 miles, and is between one and two and a half miles wide. The purchasers are Fayette county capitalists. The same persons purchased a block of 4,850 acres of coal on the Fayette side of the river last week for \$400,000 cash, and have just secured 2,000 acres on the Greene county side, from lock 7 to Dunkard's Creek, the consideration being \$180,000.
