NET TIGHTENING AROUND GILLETTE

More Experts Say That Blows Killed Sweetheart.

NO SIGNS OF BEING DROWNED

Comparisons Given Showing Conditions to Support the Prosecution.

Herkimer, N. Y., Nov. 27.—Technical testimony relating to conditions ordinarily found in the bodies of persons who have met death by drowning, marked today's sessions of the Gillette murder trial. Four of the five doctors employed as experts by the state to perform the autopsy on the body of Grace Brown, Gillette's alleged victim, were during the day called on to answer some of the questions put to the experts by counsel brought out further confirmation of the claim that there were blood clots on the girl's brain and under the scalp. Other questions were put to the doctors by Mr. Mills, Gillette's counsel, to bring out opinions tending to show that the conditions found in the dead girl's body were similar to those sometimes found in the bodies of drowned persons, and that the conditions they found at the autopsy are recognized by medical authorities as indications of drowning.

A wordy war between opposing attorneys resulted from the district attorney's effort to introduce in evidence the child taken from Grace Brown's body at the time of the autopsy. District Attorney Ward succeeded in getting the exhibit admitted in evidence, although it was objected by the defense. Dr. E. H. Douglas, who identified it.

The defense laid great stress on whether or not there was water in the Brown girl's stomach, how much if any, and what indication on drowning such a condition would be. The doctors swore that only two tablespoonfuls of fluids were found in the stomach. Dr. Hayes testified that he made an examination of the stomach a few days ago, the organ having been preserved. "There was a very small quantity of liquid in the stomach and it had no odor about it. There was no sand or mud in the stomach."

On re-cross-examination, Dr. Hayes swore that he made the latest examination of the stomach about Nov. 20. He did not know where the stomach had been since July, but it was in sealed package. The fluid would not disappear or evaporate at that time, he said, but the fluids would keep unchanged indefinitely in such a case.

Dr. S. S. Richards, called to the stand just before closing the state's case, testified that the injuries to Grace Brown's body were inflicted before death. He enumerated the injuries, as had the physicians preceding him on the witness stand.

Several Comparisons.

Dr. A. O. Douglas, who testified yesterday in the trial of Chester Gillette, charged with the murder of Grace Brown, that the girl died as the result of blows before the body was immersed in water, today gave several comparisons between the conditions usually found in drowned bodies and the conditions found in the body of Grace Brown.

Dr. Douglas' statements of yesterday were supported by Dr. E. H. Douglas.

Dr. Douglas said the blood clot on the brain was as large as a 10-cent piece, and that it was caused by external violence on the head. Dr. Douglas further said that, in his opinion, a blood clot would cause death, although there were cases where persons recovered from severe contusions.

Blood-Soaked Carpet.

It is possible that Prosecutor Ward may decide to call Miss Hannah Monahan, who is now in Uxio, but who was employed at the Glenmore Hotel, Big Moose Lake, when Grace Brown and Gillette came there last July. It is reported that Miss Monahan washed a carpet taken from the boat in which Miss Brown and Gillette went out on the lake today following the death of Miss Brown and that she discovered that the carpet was soaked with blood.

Since the trial began Gillette has begun to look for solace to the church. In a note couched in words of pleading, he begged Rev. J. M. Robinson, chaplain of the Herkimer County Jail, to visit him in his cell, and spent most of his Sunday reading the Bible.

The impression is growing that the defense will plead suicide.

There was a larger crowd than ever at the trial today. More than a thousand persons were turned away, and those who got seats were on hand as early as 7 o'clock to secure them.

The prosecution cannot complete its case before Thanksgiving, and the case will not go to the jury before Wednesday of next week.

Dr. George H. Smith today corroborated the statements of the other two physicians who preceded him that Grace Brown did not drown. His description of the injuries found on the girl's body at the time of the autopsy agreed with that given by Dr. A. O. Douglas and Dr. E. H. Douglas.

that Gillette had first spoken of the tragedy, but others had since told him differently.

"But you did swear to it, didn't you?" asked Counsel Thomas for the defense.

"Yes."

"And you knew the life of this young man depended on this verdict?"

STICK TO SHAKESPEARE

Critics Deride Idea That Earl of Rutland Wrote Plays.

London, Nov. 27.—English literary critics are not impressed by Professor Bleibtreu's book, in which the German professor seeks to prove that the real author of the Shakespearean plays was not Shakespeare, nor Bacon, but Francis, Earl of Rutland. Professor Bleibtreu builds up his theory thusly: "The low comedian, William Shakespeare, who regularly got drunk at the Marmalade Tavern," couldn't possibly have the wide learning and knowledge of other countries which the author of the Shakespearean works evidently possessed. On the other hand, Rutland is known to have spent a considerable time in France and Italy. He studied law at Padua and visited other parts of the world, where he would have gained the knowledge enabling him to write the famous plays.

"His mission to Denmark in 1603, where he went to represent King James I. at the baptism of the Danish crown prince, enabled him to obtain the local color for Hamlet. He actually met Gullenstern and Rosencrantz at the Danish court. Two members of the latter's family were Rutland's fellow students at Padua."

"Rutland was imprisoned for political reasons in 1601-1603, during which period no Shakespearean dramas appeared. The last of the 'Coriolanus' and 'The Tempest,' the last of the Shakespearean plays, appeared in 1612, the year Rutland died."

The foregoing are among some of the most striking coincidences which convinced Professor Bleibtreu, whose "proofs" perhaps are at least as strong as those of other Shakespearean dethroners. They are considered irresistible by Dr. Turzskinsky, eminent German literary critic, who calls Professor Bleibtreu's discovery as important in the realm of literature as Columbus' discovery of America was geographically and politically.

On the other hand, Professor Dowden, who fills the chair of English literature at the University of Dublin and one of the greatest of living Shakespearean authorities, sees absolutely no evidence to justify Professor Bleibtreu's theory. He has not seen the German professor's book, but, judging from the published summary, strongly believes it will prove another mare's nest. He points out that Rutland was born in 1574, twelve years later than Shakespeare, and if he was the author of the works attributed to the latter he couldn't have been the author of "Love's Labor's Lost," which is quite incredible. Professor Dowden repudiates the description of Shakespeare as a "low comedian," etc., as wholly unjustifiable.

Professor Herford, another Shakespearean authority, regards the theory as likely to prove greater rubbish than the Baconian. Dr. Abbott describes it as "absurd," and Dr. Gollanez as "rubbish."

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT

Chatham Canoeists Thrown Into Water and Herbert Pritchard Drowns.

Chatham, Nov. 26.—A sad drowning accident occurred this afternoon at 3 o'clock, as a result of which Herbert Pritchard, the eldest son of Fire Chief Richard Pritchard, lost his life.

The unfortunate young man went out on the river about half-past 2 o'clock with Wylie Braddon and George Somerville. There was a stiff breeze blowing at the time. The party made a tack for the opposite shore, and when they were within a few yards from the opposite bank, a fresh breeze came along and the canoe capsized.

When they came up, Somerville was the nearest to the bank, and, being able to swim a little, he made the shore and clung to a pile until help came. Braddon could swim, but Pritchard could not. Braddon knew this, and tried to get his companion to the canoe, which had been carried by the current some distance down the stream. He found that this was impossible, and then he tried to get him to the bank. In this he was also unsuccessful. In the meantime Pritchard, with his hands up, a young man, caught hold of Braddon, thus hindering the latter in his efforts to save his companion, who could not swim. The water was very cold, and Braddon saw that if he did not soon get clear, both of them would drown. They had gone under the water several times and both were becoming exhausted. With a mighty effort Braddon succeeded in getting clear and managed to get to the bank and held on to a pile until help came. Pritchard went down.
