Toronto, June 27.—A netition will go to-day to Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, minister of justice, bearing probably some thousands of signatures, praying for the release of Tim Flood, the Toronto second baseman, who was yestenday conteneed to fifteen who was yesterday sentenced to fifteen days in jail for assaulting Umpire Conway. ### Our Capital.

Ottawa, June 27.—The census and statistics department issued a bulletin today on the capital employed in manufacturing establishments in Canada. In 1905 the amount of capital in manufacturing industries was \$843.931,178, as compared with \$446,916,487 in 1900. This shows an increase for the five years of \$397,000,000, or about 90 per cent, while production increased by \$234,000,000 or about 50 per cent. The dispar-Ity in the ratio of increase is said to be due to the inability of recently established works to produce to their full capacity. In car and car works, for example, the ratio of production to capital in 1900 was 151, and in 1905 it was 101: on Portland cement works it was 86 and 65. in smelting works it was 67 and 32 and on electric light works it was 17 and 9 for each rangectively. # TERRIFIC ELECTRICAL STORM PLAYS HAVOC WITH NEW YORK

## Thirteen Persons Killed by Bolts, Church Steeple Ripped Off and Many Fires Started.

New York, June 27 .- A death-dealing electric storm yesterday afternoon followed a day of sweltering heat, soaked with humidity, swept over the city and surrounding territory, killing thirteen persons, injuring several, causing many fires and doing considerable damage. In this city two of the places struck were churches. The steeple of both were torn into frag-

ments by the lightning bolts. J. A. McKenna, of Newark, N. J., and his two young daughters were caught in the storm near Union, N. J. They took refuge under a tree, which a few minutes later was struck by a lightning bolt. The younger girl was

killed outright and the father and elder daughter severely shocked. At Fishkill, on the Hudson, Walter Dixonna, a negro, was struck by lightning and killed. A woman who accompanied him was stunned and burned. A lightning bolt hit John Lawless while he was at work on
