ELEUTERIO BETANCES. May Be First President of the Repu of Cuba Soon to Be Established.

Eleuterio Betances, the noted savant. Hellenist and oculist of Paris, is being talked of for the Presidency of the Cuban Republic. Dr. Betances is an ancient enemy of Spain in the West Indies and one of the men who have had most to do with the downfall of Spanish power in those islands. He is a native of Puerto Rico, but has long lived in Europe, where his skill as a surgeon and his ability as a man of letters have given him great fame and fortune. His tather was wealthy, and the Doctor was educated abroad. On his return to Puerto Rico he was soon the possessor of a great practice in his specialty. He did not believe in slavery, but did not preach against it. At the same time he manifested his disapproval of the institution by buying a negro slave baby every month, and then presenting its mother with its freedom papers. The course made him very unpopular with Spanish officials, and he was at last forced to leave the island. He traveled in Cuba, Hayti and other parts of the group and practiced medicine with great success. He later visited the



United States and made a special study of their political, economical and educational institutions. His practice in Paris has made millions of dollars for him, some of which he has drawn from the pockets of even Spaniards. He has consistently fought Spain with his influence and his wealth, and his name is well known to thousands of Cubans who never saw him. Dr. Betances is 78 years

Souldn't Round Cape Horn. The uncertainty of sails for commerce was illustrated in the ship Natuna, from London to San Francisco, in 225 days. She tried for over a month to double Cape Horn, and then, discouraged, turned eastward and crossed by Cape of Good Hope and the Pacific Ocean. She had been given up as lost, and her reinsurance while in doubt cost 40 per cent.


