## EARL GREY THE GUEST OF LONDON TODAY; WARMLY WELCOMED TO THE FOREST CITY

Driven Through Streets and Cheered at Various Points --- Much Impressed With Workingmen's Homes==-Lady Sybil Grey Entertained at "Idlewyld."

His Excellency Earl Grey, Governor-General of Canada, accompanied by his daughter, Lady Sybil, and Miss Howard, and an aide-de-camp, Captain Trotter, arrived in the city this morning and will be the guests of the city of London until their departure at 5:30 this afternoon. His excellency was met at the depot

by about 40 of London's most prom-Inent citizens, including the mayor and aldermen, Hon. C. S. Hyman, minister of public works, and Hon. Adam Beck. It was about 11:35 when the C. P. R. express pulled in with the viceregal car Cornwall, which bore the Governor-General and his party.

Hon. Mr. Hyman at once entered the car, after which he introduced Mrs. Judd, wife of the mayor, and Mrs. Coffey, wife of Senator Coffey.

Then the ladies presented two very handsome bouquets of roses to Lady Sybil and Miss Howard, after which Mr. Hyman introduced his excellency, first to Senator Coffey and then to the other gentlemen of the party. Captain Trotter, a veteran of the Boer war, and with one sleeve empty, was then introduced, the military members of the party being especially hearty in


