FRIDAY'S RECRUITS

NUMBER 22; SCORE MORE ARRIVE TODAY

British-Born From States Still Lead List.

Twenty-two recruits were received at the local mobilization centre Friday. Eighteen of these were boarded at Detroit, the remaining six being boarded at London.

Twelve of these men were placed in category A; seven in category B; two in C, and one was unit for service and placed in E.

Nine of the men came from Detroit, four from Grand Rapids, two from St. Louis, two from Cleveland; one from Jackson; one from Flint, and one from Windsor.

The birthplace of most of the recruits was England, two giving their birthplace as the United States, and several as Canada.

Another score of recruits arrived this morning from the British Mission.

QUEBEC PAPER PRAISES BATTALION IN CHARGE OF FORMER LONDONER
