Thoroughly Distrustful of Germany and Expecting To Get Raw Deal.

FAITH IN CAUSE GONE

Would Escape Having to Re-"The Imperishable Word of volve in Exclusively German Orbit After War.

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 19. — While Emperor William and King Ferdinand of Bulgaria have been exchanging assurances at Sofie of the unshakeable loyalty of Bulgaria and Germany to each other and the permanent nature of the alliance of the two countries, Bulgarian agents abroad have been endeavoring to get into touch with the Entente Powers on the subject of peace and subsequent relations. Their efforts are declared to be inspired by apprehension that Germany and Austria-Hungary, particularly the latter, may not be over-zeaious in defending Bulgaria's interests at the peace conference, as well as by a desire on Bulgaria's part to escape from revolving in an exclusively German orbit after the war.

The Associated Press correspondent is able to report that a Bulgarian representative recently sought and obtained an opportunity in a neutral European capital to lay before the Entente governments the special desires of his country with regard to a peace settlement and in a one-sided conversation explained Bulgarian aspirations to regain an independent political status as soon as the war concluded, and resume cordial relations with the Entente Powers.

Does Not Want isolation.

Does Not Want Isolation. As the case was presented, in short, the Central Europe idea of an economic leageu in which Bulgaria would play a comparatively minor role, does not appeal to the Bulgarian mind. comparatively minor role, does not appeal to the Bulgarian mind.

Attempts are also being made to get before the public in America and in the Entente countries a defence if Bulgarian pretensions to Macedonia and Dobruija, the suggestion even being openly made from the Bulgarian side that Serbia should be comparsated with Austrian territory, from Bosnia and Herzegovina, a suggestion which is pointed to as illustrative of the attitude of many Bulgarians toward their own allies.

The correspondent has of late heard of considerable ill-feeling between the Bulgarians and their allies. Complaints are made that Bulgarian divisions were compelled to march long distances on foot, while favored German troops rolled past them in trains, this favoritism bringing forth extreme bitterness by the Sulgarians.

Distrustful of Germany.

The German attempt to maintain control of Bulgaria's single coal field. has excited much unfriendly comment also in Bulgaria, and Field Marshal von Mackensen is charged with favor-ing the Germans at Bulgarian expense. Furthermore, the press controversy in certain German and Austrian newspapers, in which the Serbian claims to parts of Macedonia were defended, apparently has left an indelible impression of distrust on Bulgarian public opinion and the interchanges of cordial telegrams between German and Bulgarian statesmen seems to have been unable to efface.

It remains to be seen whether Emperor William's trip, declared to have been undertaken with this purpose in view, will prove any more successful.
