#### FOOD BOARD RELAXES MANY RESTRICTIONS ON STORES, BAKERIES, ETC.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—Changes in the food regulations following upon the armistice of November 11, insofar as they affect the general public, are summarized in a Canada Food Board statement as follows:

Compulsory restrictions of the amount of flour which may be held in store by dealers, householders and others have been rescinded.

The use of substitutes by manufacturers, bakers, public restaurants, and households is no longer compulsory, but in view of the necessity of conservation and in order to prevent waste to stock of substitutes already on hand the food board urges the greatest possible voluntary use of them to be continued.

Sandwiches may now be served in public eating places during the noon meal hour.

Restrictions on the quantity of bread served at public eating places are now removed.

## **ABOUT 80 RETURNED MEN ARRIVE IN CITY**

Big Party Taken to Princess Avenue School.

An enthusiastic welcome by the largest crowd that has yet witnessed the returning of men from the front was accorded the party of about 80 heroes who arrived at 1:30 via the Grand

accorded the party of about 80 heroes who arrived at 1:30 via the Grand Trunk.

The men were taken to Princess Avenue School, where they were given a luncheon. They were addressed by Warden D. A. Graham, County Clerk John Stuart, Ed. Lance and Alderman F. Harley. After that their troubles were attended to and they were allowed to proceed to their homes.

The party is under the charge of Lieut. G. S. Wright of London, Ont., who is very indignant at the time it has taken his party to get here. Railway officials, who say that morning trains out of Toronto could have been held for a few minutes had they been advised that there were men for nearby points. As it is the soldiers had to hang around Toronto for afternoon and evening trains.

"These are nearly all low category men," said Lieut. Wright. "Many of them are railway construction workers, but all of them have been to France, and many have taken their place in the line, although graded as B category men. We landed on Thursday, and it has taken us all this time to get home. Out train lost time continuously."

Pte. W. Bates of this city was inpred when one of the hospitals at Etaples was bombed in September, 1917. He was an occupant of the hospital at the time. "The scene was a terrible one," he stated, "and many of the patients were injured." Pte. Bates went overseas with the 135th Battalion and was gassed.
