MUST INCREASE PRODUCTION OR FACE TRAGEDY

British Trade Union Federation Management Issues Warning.

FACTS MUST BE FACED

Political Strikes Bound To End in Either Failure or Revolution.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The quarterly report of the general federation of trades unions contains a warning by the management committee.

"November, 1913, to May, 1914, will be a period of months," says the report, "in which the returns and production of the various industries will be reduced. The report adds and continues: 'Strikes have been precipitated which might have been avoided and union funds have been needlessly dissipated. Some strikes had a distinctly political origin. Political strikes must either fail or end in revolution. They are not against the capitalists, but against the community. It is not the capitalist who suffers, but the people. Against such strikes the Government must protect the people or surrender its functions. The effect of such strikes is to decrease production and increase the price of all commodities. In view of the national situation

and the possibility of a grave shortage of the foodstuffs, the management committee is of the opinion that the outstanding ones are that the war is over, that competitive laws as between nations are now fast becoming operative, that food and raw materials required for the subsistence of Great Britain must be bought from countries over whose merchants our Government has no control, and that commodities must be paid for with goods, not paper."

ARCHDUKE JOSEPH RESIGNS AS HEAD OF HUNGARY GOVT.

Action Follows Peace Conference's Refusal To Recognize Administration.

Budapest, Aug. 23.—(By the Associated Press).—Archduke Joseph and the cabinet of Premier Friedrich have resigned as a result of the refusal of the peace conference to recognize them.

ROMANIA WARNED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The supreme council today approved the note drafted by the reparations committee, warning the Rumanian Government of retaliatory action which will be taken if the Rumanians continue to make requisitions in Hungary. Premier Clemenceau signed the note, and it was forwarded to Bucharest.

HEARST SILENT ON SUBJECT OF THE ELECTION

Expectation of "Important Announcements" Was Not Fulfilled.

DEFENDS GOVERNMENT

Says Responsibility For Nickel Export Rests With Dominion.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

BRANTFORD, Aug. 24.—Predictions of a 12,000 crowd for the rally of Conservative stalwarts from the ridings of North and South Brant and South Oxford, North and South Norfolk and Haldimand fell sadly to the ground at the Tory rally held at Mohawk Park here yesterday. To place the attendance at a thousand would be a generous estimate. Hearst and his two cabinet colleagues, Hon. F. G. McDermid and Hon. W. D. Macpherson, undoubtedly felt the extraordinary coldness of the gathering, for except from the platform there was no applause during the three-hour talk-session.

In spite of the predictions that important announcements would be made, the addresses contained little of importance. The date of the prohibition referendum is still locked and lodged in the mind of the premier. He declared that it would be not earlier than October 1 and not later than October 23, but otherwise disclosed nothing. As for a provincial election the Sphinx would not have been more non-committal. "But when the election comes, be it near or far," was as close as Hon. F. G. McDermid would come in appealing to the electors for support of the Government.

Thanked the Premier. Senator John Fisher presided at the gathering, and the only other speakers beside the Governmental representatives were W. S. Brewster, ex-M. P. P. for South Brant, who urged that as there was no reason to turn the Government out, there was every reason for rallying to its support, and Mrs. S. W. Second of Brantford, who thanked the premier for extending the franchise to women, and urged the women to turn out and get every other woman to the polls for the referendum, declaring that she had no misgivings as to the way the women would vote.

Hon. F. G. McDermid was the first speaker. Practically his entire address was a defence of the Government policies and a Te Deum of praise for what had been done in the past five years. His defence of the roads policy of the Government was that the growth of motor traffic necessitated more Government aid. It was not fair that a farmer on a main road should bear the entire burden of maintaining a road for the benefit of through traffic. The Dominion Government grant of twenty millions would take much of the burden off the counties.

Praise for Women. In his introductory remarks Premier Hearst paid a tribute to the war work of the women and to the record set by Ontario. Incidentally extending the praise to the Liberal opposition which had supported the war measures of the Government. There has been no politics during the war. But the Liberals at Toronto and Ottawa had held conventions and drafted platforms.

"Platforms and promises are easy to make. Performances are what count," declared the premier. Mr. Dewar had said that the platform was an easy one, on almost every conceivable subject. Mr. Brackin's plank had been added, and the Liberal leader was willing to take in the U. F. O. platform, but the U. F. O. declared that he would have to be a bigger man than he was to take its platform. "If you have a platform or a plank or an ear or a chip that will help him to float, let him have it," commented the premier.

He declared that he did not intend to enter on a campaign of vilification, but he was not going to let Mr. Dewar get away with everything. As for his remarks at Eugene's Falls, which Mr. Dewar construed as being a declaration by him that the U. F. O. was made up of "communist Grits," and that they were "donkey engines for the Grit party," he stated that he had only warned the farmers' clubs not to become "communist Grit clubs." The premier declared that at Toronto Mr. Dewar had attempted to make the Labor party and the United Farmers donkey engines to the Grit party.

A Hit at Dewar. "If there is anybody familiar with muck and filth it is Hon. H. H. Dewar," declared the premier, charging that during the war Mr. Dewar went from the Atlantic to the Pacific trying to stir the political embers into flames and prepare the boys overseas. As for Mr. Dewar's charges that Ontario nickel sent to the United States went to Germany, and was used to make bullets which cost the lives of brave Canadian soldiers, the Dominion Government, and not the Ontario Government, had to assume responsibility. The Dominion Government at the beginning of the war had adopted a licensing system which had the approval of the Right Hon. Bonar Law. If there was wrong-doing, that lay with the Dominion Government and British admiralty, not the Ontario Government. If Mr. Dewar had charges to

make, he could get his friends in the House at Ottawa to make them there, where the responsible ministers were. The province had nothing to do with importations or exportations.

Favors O. T. A. Dealing with prohibition, the premier declared that personally he was in favor of the Ontario temperance act, but the Government would abide by the will of the people, as shown in the referendum. The law would be enforced according to that vote. The questions were not trick questions. They stood on their own bottom, and the people would decide. Every question had to be voted on, but there was no need to vote "yes" or "no" on all of them collectively. Each question could be answered as the voter wished. The vote would be taken not earlier than October 1 and not later than October 22. It would depend upon the preparation of the voters' list. He made no reference to the time of the provincial elections.

Hon. W. D. Macpherson urged the electors to judge the Government by its whole record, not by one issue. An interesting sidelight of the meeting was in the fact that the entire police force was present at the picnic. Some people started the rumor that employees in Brantford factories were organized to prevent the premier from getting a hearing by the mass singing of the chorus "How Dry I Am." Managers of the picnic took the intimation seriously and called the police to be present. It all originated in a letter to the mind, and there was no untoward incident. Nevertheless, wise ones are having the last word in the discomfiture of the managers of the picnic.

COMMITTEE HAS AMENDED PEACE TREATY CLAUSE

Gives German Rights in Shantung to China, Not Japan.

VOTE WAS 9 TO 8

Amendment Offered in the Foreign Relations Committee by Lodge.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 23.—By a vote of 9 to 8 the Senate Foreign Relations Committee today adopted an amendment to the peace treaty by which German rights in Shantung Province, China, would go to China instead of Japan.

All the Democratic members and Senator McCumber, Republican, North Dakota, voted against the amendment.

Chairman Lodge offered the amendment under which the word "Japan" would be stricken from the Shantung sections of the treaty and the word "China" substituted.

After voting to amend the treaty the committee notified President Wilson today that it could not intelligently proceed with its work on amendments until he furnished additional information.

GIANT FRENCH PLANE "GOLIATH" LANDED SAFELY AFTER ALL

PARIS, Aug. 23.—(By the Associated Press).—The French airplane Goliath has landed north of Dakar with a broken propeller. All on board are safe.

Asquith May Again Enter Politics in Great Britain

LONDON, Aug. 23.—Herbert H. Asquith, former prime minister, is reported to be making arrangements to re-enter active politics.

The Edinburgh Evening News declares that Mr. Asquith probably will take the earliest opportunity to seek candidature for the House of Commons.

Sale of Surplus Army Food Brings Out Great Crowds

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—Basket in hand, thousands of men, women and children yesterday hurried to the 28 school buildings in the second day's sale of surplus army foods. The crowds were the two or three times as large as on the opening day. The municipal stores were swamped. Most stocks were sold in the forenoon. Call went out for additional help. Many times the amount of supplies on hand could have been sold if it had been possible to make the distribution.

The public was most anxious to get meat, and eagerly took up the 250,000 pounds of bacon offered in Manhattan and the Bronx. Eight trucks were used to carry bacon from Fifty-ninth street and First avenue to the school stores, but the army could not keep pace with the demand. In all, 125 trucks were employed to transport the food. The allotment of bacon for New York was announced as 1,800,000 pounds. Estimates yesterday were that close to 1,500,000 pounds of food were sold on the second day. The average received at the schools was about \$1,500 each, and the total about \$55,000.

Employment Is Increasing in Quebec and Ont.

Reports From Both Provinces Show Conditions Are Improving.

OTTAWA, Aug. 23.—Employment conditions in Ontario and Quebec are improving, according to reports to the department of labor by employers throughout these two provinces. During the week ending August 9, 2,886 firms increased the number of their employees by 591, an increase of 2 per cent, and expected a further jump in the following week of 2,071 workers, or 6 per cent. The industries registering increases during the week included: Metals, 4 per cent; leather, 3 per cent; textiles, 6 per cent; building and construction, 2 per cent; commercial and mercantile, 1 per cent; lumbering, 1½ per cent; vehicles, 2 per cent; quarrying and mining, 2½ per cent; railway construction, 1½ per cent.

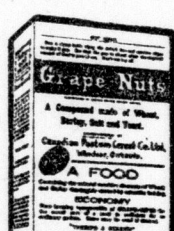
