It is said that an excellent location for the hospital would be the site opposite the Victoria Hospital and next to the new Medical School building.

UNSKILLED LABOR IS TOO PLENTFUL

Bureau Finds Men Are Coming
From Outside.

That there is a surplus of labor offering in the city that is unusual for the time of year was a statement made by the Ontario Employment Bureau today at the local office of the Ontario Government Employment Bureau.

The number of men applying for work at the present time is practically equal to the number of openings in the city, which is a situation that has not been known since the great strike and the closing down of factories for lack of coal.

There are also many returned soldiers, handicapped by disabilities, for which the bureau has been unable to find employment suitable to their physical condition.

The demand for skilled workers in the wood-working and furniture-making trades, bricklayers and masons, is all the greater building lines, is very good, while the demand for experienced workmen and laborers is also strong.

SAYS PRUSSIANIZED AMERICA MUST GO

House Leader Would Repeat
Wartime Measures.

Washington, Dec. 9.—Legislation regarding the embargo, food control and some other wartime laws, is being drafted by Chairman Porter of the House foreign affairs committee, at the suggestion of House leaders, recently held a series of conferences with Attorney General Palmer for discussion of the subject.

Repeals of most wartime measures, excepting the prohibition law and the act creating the office of alien property custodian, would not be opposed by the department of justice, Mr. Porter said today.

House leaders believe the repeal of the wartime restrictions would be a better means of restoring the wartime status than would the passage of either a joint or concurrent resolution declaring the war with Germany at an end.

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT REACHES AGREEMENT WITH D'ANNUNZIO

Settlement of Fiume Problem
Reached After Prolonged
Conference.

LONDON, Dec. 9.—Reports that the Italian Government had arrived at an agreement with General D'Annunzio regarding the question of Fiume, which city of D'Annunzio has been holding with an armed force, insisting that it was and should remain Italian, were received today in Exchange Telegraph dispatches from Rome.

ELECTED PRESIDENT OF COSTA RICAN REPUBLIC

Managua, Nicaragua, Dec. 9.—Julio Acosta, former provisional president of Costa Rica, has been elected to the presidency of that country. He received 99 per cent of the popular vote, as against 10 per cent for his opponent, Jose M. Roto.

Senor Acosta was chief of the revolutionary movement of August last.

Not Inclined To Allow Salary
Question To Be Deferred.

If prompt action is not taken by the board of education on the matter of teachers' salaries in London, it is probable that the new year will see a new teaching staff. Teachers in all parts of the province have signed agreements not to take the places of other teachers who leave their positions because the salaries are inadequate.

The teachers claim that they are faced with the old story of the whole province being lost in the shuffle of election time. The present board may try to put it off to the next year's board, and the board may plead lack of information to deal with the matter, and accordingly delay action for some months.

KOLCHAK'S NEW GOVT. TO WAGE FIGHT TO END ON BOLSHEVISM

New All-Russian Government
Plans To Open Strong

PARTY IS DEMANDED
Reds Will Be Given No Quar-
ter in New Movement
To Be Launched.

Irkutsk, Siberia, Friday, Dec. 5.—Bolshevism will be fought a battle to the death by the new All-Russian Government formed by Admiral Kolchak, under the premiership of V. Popelievsky, according to statements made by S. N. Tretyakov, vice premier, and acting minister of foreign affairs, to the Associated Press today. Departments having internal affairs under their supervision are no less employed in preparations for this struggle than are those in whose hands are the foreign relations of the government.

Party lines have almost vanished in the assembling of the present government. P. Bourishinsky, minister of finance, has not considered himself a member of any political organization; Premier Popelievsky was formerly a Social-Democrat, and L. Shulimovskiy, minister of labor, was at one time a Social-Democrat of the right. To that extent the new cabinet may be considered as a coalition, being similar to the one it succeeded.
