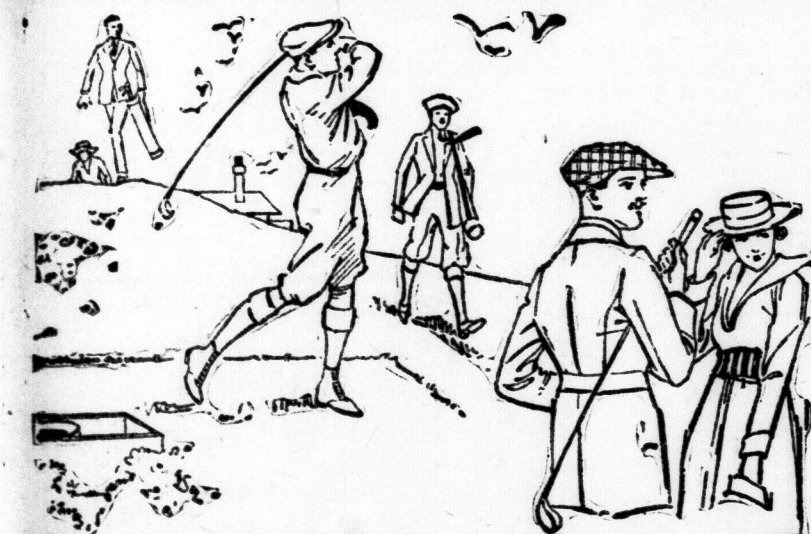

ENGLAND TO BE DRY IN TEN YEARS, SAYS PUSSYFOOT JOHNSON

Cannot Compete in World Trade Otherwise, Says the Temperance Worker.

WINDSOR, June 21.—"A wet England cannot compete in the markets of the world with a dry America, and because Great Britain is convinced of this she will enter the prohibition column within ten years," declared "Pussyfoot" Johnson, noted American temperance leader, in Detroit today. "If America remains dry, every manufacturing nation will have to follow," he said. "Nearly one-third of the nations of Europe are nearer prohibition than we were ten years ago."

Questioned as to his opinion whether the Democratic party at the San Francisco convention would adopt a dry platform and a wet candidate, or a wet platform and a dry candidate, or neither, Johnson declared his conviction that both the damp platform and the moist candidate would be missing.

Asked if prohibition really prohibited, he replied that it had been his experience that it took about three years for wets to settle down to accept the situation, and after that things went pretty smoothly. He refused to commit himself on the duration of the period of the home-brew industry.

He said Ireland was headed for the dry ranks. All of the 76 Sinn Féin members of Parliament were total abstainers, he said, and so, too, was every member of the Irish National Army. "The Sinn Féiners will not trust their secrets to a drunkard nor a drinking Irishman," he declared. "The British Government has been trying to discover the Sinn Féin secrets for two years, and it doesn't know yet who the commander-in-chief of the army is. Twenty-three out of the 26 members of Parliament from Ulster are for prohibition, and the first thing that Ireland will do when she obtains home rule, either under one parliament or two, will be to drive out liquor from the country, as St. Patrick drove out the snakes."

Has Three Eyes
Johnson made light of the loss of his eye, occasioned during a riot in London, England, in which he was the central figure, and declared he was better off than most men who had only two eyes, for he carried an extra glass on his suitcase, making a total of three. He said the loss of his eye had reflected toward the benefit of the prohibition cause, as the result of sympathy extended him.

PLOT AGAINST SHAH UNEARTHED IN PERSIA

PARIS, June 21.—A dispatch to the Havas Agency from Teheran, Persia, says that during the night of June 15-16 a plot against the shah and the members of his cabinet was discovered. Precautionary measures were taken, the dispatch adds.

SENATE RAPS UNION GOVT. ABOUT HIRING EFFICIENCY EXPERTS

Tory Body Passes Resolution Scoring Appointment of U. S. Firm.

GUTHRIE'S PROPOSAL

Believes His Plan Will Overcome All Objections Being Made.

OTTAWA, June 21.—(Canadian Press)—In the opinion of the Senate, the work of reorganizing the civil service can be done by Canadians. By a vote of 23 to 10, the upper chamber today approved a motion introduced by Senator Turfitt reading as follows: "That in the proposed reorganization of the various departments of the Government, it is the opinion of this House that men with expert ability of a high order can be secured in Canada, who are capable of doing this work in a thoroughly satisfactory manner."

Senator Robertson, minister of labor, defended the Government, saying that leading business concerns in Canada and those to other countries for experts when they were not obtainable at home. An organization with special experience in the work to be done did not exist in Canada. Senator Robertson stated that the head of Griffenhagen and Associates was not a German, his father having been born in the United States. Senator McLennan agreed with Senator Robertson, and stated that there was no business efficiency firm in Canada. He stated that in many instances the United States secured accountants in Great Britain, while many American efficiency experts found employment in England.

WOULD INCREASE INTEREST

OTTAWA, June 21.—(By Canadian Press)—In the Senate today a motion by Senator Power to increase the rate to depositors in government banks from three to four per cent was discussed at some length, but was finally lost on division. In supporting his motion Senator Power pointed out that the rate had once been four per cent and could be changed now by order-in-council.

Senator Bostock supported the motion of Senator Power, but called attention to the fact that savings certificates through which the people could obtain five per cent were still issued. Senator Belge argued against the motion, saying that in England and France no interest was paid on deposits, and that the interest was lower in the United States than in Canada. Sir James Loughheed claimed that the Dominion Government savings banks were merely a convenience for the people, and were not intended to rival chartered private banks. If the Government raised its rates the result would be an advance in the bank rates, which might seriously disturb business conditions.

TO REORGANIZE POSTOFFICE DEPT.

OTTAWA, June 21.—(By Canadian Press)—In answer to a question by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux in the House of Commons today, Sir George Foster stated that the firm of Griffenhagen and Associates had been appointed to investigate and reorganize the postoffice and other departments, because it was considered this firm was best qualified for the work.

Sir George stated that the firm was being paid \$10,000 a month. There were no German-Americans in the organization and the trained staff of experts employed by the firm comprised a number of Canadians. The work of reorganization performed by this firm in the department of public printing and stationery was considered very satisfactory.

The order-in-council concerning the engagement of Griffenhagen and Associates, Limited, to reorganize the postoffice and customs department was tabled in the House today by Sir George Foster. The order sets forth that in the organization of the printing bureau a saving of \$500,000 per annum was effected, and the committee was of the opinion that the saving would reach \$700,000 a year within another twelve months. By efficient organization of the whole of government departments it is estimated in the report to the cabinet council, millions of dollars could be saved.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars could be saved by efficient reorganization of the postoffice department, it is estimated, and a proportionate amount in the customs department. The committee, composed of Sir George Foster and Messrs. Calder, Rowell, Sifton and Burrill, recommends that Griffenhagen and Associates be retained to reorganize the postoffice and customs departments and at the same time to make observations and examinations with a view to reorganizing all the other government departments. The Government may or may not decide to proceed with further reorganization once.

Will Produce It

Speaking on a motion by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux for production of all correspondence between himself and Judge Robson, regarding the latter's resignation from the chairmanship of the board of commerce, Sir George Foster said that such correspondence as was in the public interest would be brought down. On this understanding Mr. Lemieux's motion was adopted.

When the House resumed consideration of the franchise bill in committee Hon. Hugh Guthrie moved that clause 109, respecting poll advanced, be amended to make these applicable only to railway employees, sailors and commercial travelers.

The solicitor-general also moved that the preceding clause be amended to provide that in the taking of a referendum under the Canada temperance act the chief election officer be given power to say what part of the machinery under the proposed act shall apply, and also to provide that the voters' list used in the Ontario provincial election in October, 1919, shall be accepted, without revision, as the basis of lists for a temperance referendum in that province. The Ontario referendum is to be taken this fall.

Is Not Necessary
The minister explained that much of the machinery provided under the new act was not necessary for a simple temperance referendum, and the chief election officer was therefore given power to dispense with the use of that unnecessary machinery. His decision, however, on that point must be published in the Canada Gazette four weeks before the date of voting. The amendment carried.

To Mr. Jacques Bureau, the minister explained that he had no objection to amending section 22, to provide that lists two years old should be accepted as the basis of voters' lists under the new act. This was because in certain sections of the country voters' lists were revised only every second year.

There was no discussion on the amendment to give the chief election officer the power to fix scales of pay for returning officers and election officials. The scales of pay, about five in number, would not necessarily be permanent.

Answering Mr. Mackenzie King, Hon. Mr. Guthrie said several names for the position of chief election officer had been considered, while a joint conference embracing all sides of the House would be held before final decision on the ultimate official, and the Government would have to assume the responsibility for such an appointment.

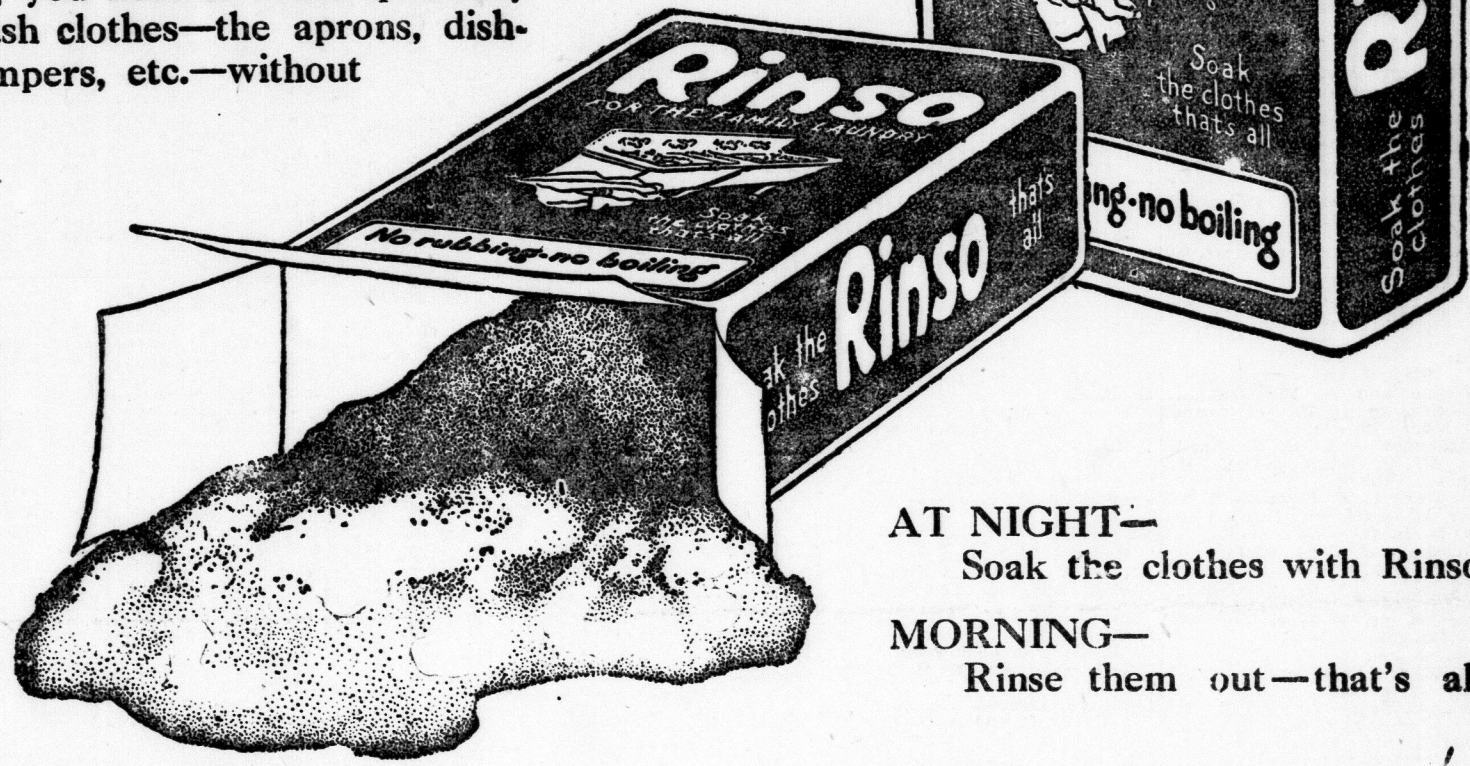

purposes were then carried without any discussion. The only one of note was that which provides for a man who may be disqualified as a basis for the franchise, where there were provincial lists in existence not more than one year old, had met with the objection that there were five or six cities in Quebec where there was no annual list, but a list prepared every two years. Mr. Guthrie thought this situation might be met by providing that provincial lists be adopted as a basis when not more than two years old.

Was Objectionable
Mr. King said the system announced by the Government of having lists prepared by enumerators was the system adopted under the war-time election act, and proved a most objectionable feature in that legislation. The proposal to make it part of the permanent election machinery would create dissatisfaction and complete want of confidence in the Government.

Asked for an interpretation of the term "provincial lists," Mr. Guthrie stated that under the act the last official provincial list would be used as the basis of the new federal list.

Mr. King declared that the Government must take a reasonable attitude toward the suggestions of the Opposition or it would have difficulty in putting through the clause. He did not wish to move an amendment, because he thought an agreement should be arrived at. The lists that were prepared for the municipalities and approved by the courts of revision should be acceptable as a basis for the federal lists. Why should an army of enumerators be appointed to prepare complete new lists in Ontario when the municipal lists were available? The municipal lists were open to the public, and a man by looking at them, could tell whether or not he was entitled to vote.

He was quite satisfied to have the lists revised and brought up to date through the machinery which was provided under the bill being considered. Judges and officials in whom the people had confidence should attend to this revising, and not enumerators appointed by the Government. When Mr. King himself would have to discuss when the House rose at 6 o'clock for dinner.
