The result came as a surprise to close followers of the game for the reason that Shrubb has been bothered with a weak leg since the Longboat race, and it was hardly expected that he would go the whole route. Altho apparently in pain from the thirteenth mile, when he began to limp, and thru the closing stages he reeled and staggered from side to side, he finished up with a sprint. It is almost certain that the twenty mile race with Longboat will have to be postponed.

At the start Shrubb's left leg was wrapped in cement bandages from the ankle to just below the knee. He said he was feeling fit, but his immediate supporters expressed some doubt about his ability to finish. Mayor Payette of Montreal started them on their way at 841. St. Yves led for a few yards, but as in the Longboat race Shrubb sprinted and got the front place before the turn out of the stretch.
