ARMY BALLOON EXPLODES

French Dirigible "Republique" Wrecked When Broken Propeller Blade Bursts Envelope.

MOULINS, France, Sept. 26.—While easing over the national road which leads from Paris to Antibes, and when at a height of between 500 and 600 feet, the French dirigible military balloon Republique exploded Saturday morning, and fell to the ground. The four men on board were killed. They were Captain Marchal, Lleutenant Phaure and Sub-Lieutenants Vincenot and Reux.

It was the intention of Captain Mar-chal, who was in charge of the air-ship, to stop at Nevers and an auto-mobile containing mechanicians was following the balloon. It was almost directly beneath it when the disaster

The car fell straight down, carrying the fluttering remnants of the enve-lope, and the occupants were buried beneath the wreckage. All were dead, except Phaure, who

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
