SOLDIERS INTERESTED IN WAR RELICS EXHIBITION

Visited by Hundreds Since Monday Morning—Unique Collection.

The British Exhibition of War Relics and Trophies, given by the 10th Regiment at 95 King street east, has been visited by hundreds of soldiers since it opened on Monday morning.

The Tommies are taking a great interest in the modern weapons of war that are displayed in this collection of over 700 pieces direct from the battlefields of Europe. The different type of guns, grenades and bullets used by the armies are displayed and ably explained by the lecturer with the exhibition. The soldiers are given a first-hand insight on what they will see at the front.

General Logie visited the show on Saturday and was loud in his praise of the collection. He is another officer who claims the most attention of the visitors. This plane saw five months of the front line of the allies, he found before it was brought down by a German shell. The wings are shell-riddled and the pilot was mortally wounded when this plane was put out of commission. A bomb, dropped from a zeppelin that killed a woman and injured her husband at Southend, 30 miles from London, is another object that always has a crowd examining it. Aeroplane, darts, German swords, pieces of shells fired into Hartlepool by the Blucher water-bombers that have saved soldiers' lives and iron crosses snatched from German officers' breasts are a few of the articles on view.

The exhibition is open daily from ten in the morning until ten at night at 95 King street east.

Chatham Ministers Decide To Hold a Week of Prayer

Chatham, Dec. 5.—Believing that prayer is one of the strongest weapons on the side of the allies, the Ministerial Association has decided that the first week in January will be a week of prayer in Chatham, when it is intended to hold a spiritual revival as is being held in England today. Members of all denominations will join in the nightly services, which are to be held in the First Presbyterian Church. And sermons will be delivered by prominent preachers from outside towns. A committee has been appointed to organize the revival.

PICKERING CALL TO MINISTER.

At a joint meeting of the united Presbyterian Churches of St. Andrew's, Pickering and St. John's Broughton, held for the purpose of moderating in the call for a minister, Rev. G. S. Lloyd, M.A., a recent graduate of Knox College, was unanimously tendered the position.

THE CAVELL MEMORIAL.

The jury which has been examining rough sketches of the monument to be erected to the memory of Miss Edith Cavell, sent in by various artists, has selected four.

The first, drawn by M. Gabriel Pech, appears over the initials "L.P." The second is called "Anti-Boche" and is submitted by M. Andre Vermare. The third is entitled "Fides" and is by M. Edouard The fourth is by M. Ernest Dubois and is entitled "Let Us Remember."

In an interview M. Gabriel Pech said he had not tried to hope he would receive a prize. "I put my whole soul into my sketch," he added, "and tried to depict the martyr in Miss Cavell. I have not tried to surround it with dramatic decorations. I have only shown a spiked helmet which has rolled to the feet of the victim and has dishonored the name of Germany."

PRESERVE POTATOES BY INCREASING DEMURRAGE

Question to Be Argued Before Railway Commission in Toronto.

Ottawa, Dec. 5.—The holding up of potato shipments and allowing them to freeze and become useless for food, thus increasing the scarcity and cost in certain localities, has been referred by the minister of labor to the railway commission. The board has now under consideration ways and means of effectually putting a stop to any recurrence of such a destruction of valuable food, and one of the means suggested is increasing the demurrage from the dollar at present to a much larger sum, say five dollars a day.

A special session of the railway commission will be held in Toronto on Dec. 11, when all sides of the question will be examined and evidence taken.

Berlin Makes Big Estimate Of Entente Powers' Losses

Berlin, Dec. 5.—(Via Sayville.)—The total losses of the entente in the present war have been 15,000,000 men, according to figures given out by the Association for Research into the Social Consequences of the War, Copenhagen, as quoted in an Overseas News Agency statement today.

Of this number, says the news agency summary of the report, Great Britain has lost 1,200,000 men, Russia 8,500,000, France 3,700,000, Italy 800,000, Serbia 480,000, Belgium 220,000 and Roumania 200,000.
