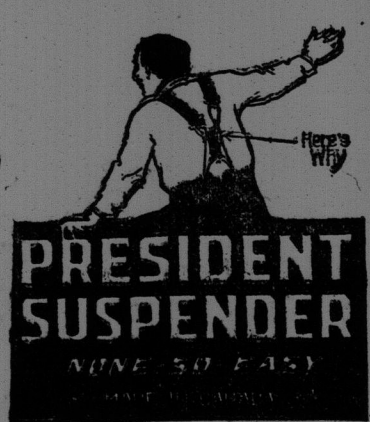

St. Charles Tupper observed his ninety-fourth birthday yesterday and congratulations were called to him by the acting premier of Canada.

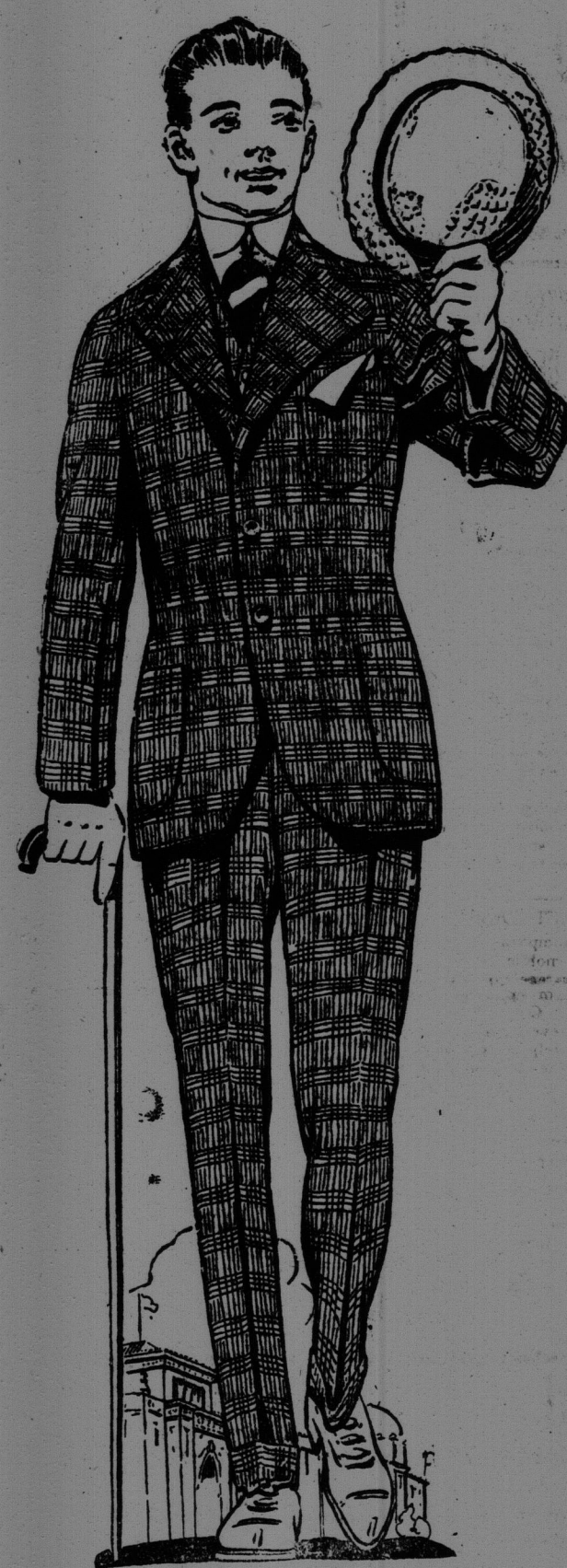
