U. S. TOURING TEAMS MUST HAVE CARDS

Amateur Authorities Warn Players Violation of Rules Will Ban Further Visits

A warning bulletin for American teams touring the Maritime Provinces regarding violations of amateur rules was issued by President Doyle of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. and announcement was made here last evening by W. E. Stirling, vice president. He said that all American teams must have amateur cards from the American A. A. U. which is affiliated with the C. A. A. U. When in the Maritimes the teams must play only strictly amateur teams and that if they meet either professionals or non registered teams they will be suspended. In addition their action will bar other teams from touring this section as the authorities will not grant a sanction for the games.

TORONTO, June 26—Members of all United States amateur baseball teams playing exhibition games in Canada in future, will have to produce cards issued by the United States Amateur Athletic Association, the Ontario Baseball Amateur executive decided at a meeting here last night.

WELL KNOWN HERE

William J. Frezell of C. P. S. Company Passes Away in Quebec

At Jeffrey Hale Hospital, Quebec City, on June 11, William J. Frezell died in his 62nd year. He was born in Ingersoll, a son of the late Augustus Frezell. He was connected with the Dominion Express Company in Ingersoll, and was later transferred to Montreal. For the last 15 or 20 years he had been in charge of shipping for the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company at Quebec City in the summer and Saint John in the winter. He was well known here.

Mr. Frezell had been in poor health for three years and contracted pneumonia late in May. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Joseph and William of Quebec City, and two daughters, Mrs. J. Fortier of Cambridge, Mass., and Miss Augustus Frezell of London. Two sisters, Mrs. Donald McDonald of Toronto and Mrs. Rose Frezell of Columbus, O., also survive. The funeral was held at Ingersoll, Ont.
