STATE OF TRADE IN UNITED STATES

(Bradstreet's.)
Wholesale and jobbing trade, and to a
slightly lesser degree, industry, tend to
expand as commodities and markets
hitherto lagging in the country of the
United States, and a few "good" reports now
appear in Bradstreet's.
The general stock market, too, seems to
have been inhibited a little more con-
fidence and is a shade firmer, while the
bond market, especially as regards the
Liberties, shows sustained and, indeed,
added strength, the latter securities, in
fact, reaching the highest prices of the
year. Increased buying and slightly
larger sales of output feature the pig
iron and finished steel markets, the in-
dex figures of which, at last, mark a
turn upward. Lumber and coal buying

TO SHOW SHE NEEDS TROOPS SHE HAS

Aim of France at Wash-
ington Conference—Sees Ger-
many Still Powerful.

Paris, Oct. 6.—The aim of the French
government at the Washington con-
ference on armaments and Far Eastern af-
fairs is to convince the delegates of other
nationalities, especially those of the U.
S., that France is not unduly armed and
that her security requires the number of
men in active service.

Marshal Poch will be prepared to lay
before the conference every particular
concerning the present land armaments
of France. France is reducing her army
The troops in active service today are
about sixty per cent. of the number on
May 1 of this year. France now has be-
tween 450,000 and 500,000, including the
army on the Rhine and colonial troops.

Just how far France can go toward dis-
armament in the face of information re-
ceived from Germany concerning the
country's power for prompt mobilization
and in the absence of other guarantees
than France's own troops.

A Billion and a Quarter Gold
Marks from Germany—
—Evolution of Income Tax.

London, Oct. 6.—(Canadian Press.)—
A Reuter cable from Melbourne quotes
Premier W. M. Hughes, speaking in the
Australian House of Representatives to
the effect that when Germany pays her
war reparations debt, Australia's share
will be one and a quarter billion gold
marks.

It was, he said, for parliament to de-
cide whether Australia should resume

trade with Germany. Australia was the only country that had not already done so.

The Australian parliament, said the
premier, should adopt the imperial con-
ference wireless scheme. In regard to
air communication, he recommended two
years' experiment with four British air-
ships to test the practicability of a per-
manent service between England and
Australia.

Sir Jos. Cook, treasurer, said certain
importing firms avoided paying an in-
come tax by selling their produce to a
subsidiary company in Australia at a
price little below the selling price to the
Australian public, thus showing but a
small taxable profit. The law, he said,
would have to be amended to prevent
this manoeuvre.

CENSUS SHOWS FAMILY DECREASING IN NUMBER

Figures Reveal a Steady Decline Since
1880—The South Has the Largest.

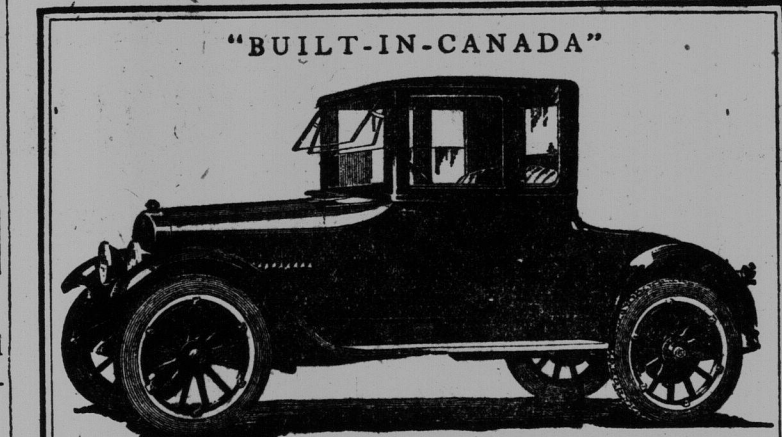
Washington, Oct. 6.—Decrease during
the last decade in the average number
of persons in a family and to a dwelling
in the United States is indicated by com-
parative statistics made public today by
the Census Bureau. The 1920 census
showed, a statement said, that the na-

tion's population was grouped into 24-
861,676 families residing in 20,497,204
dwellings, making an average of 4.3 per-
sons to a family and 6.1 persons to a
dwelling.

In 1910 the average number of persons
to a family was 4.5 and to a dwelling
6.2. The average in both cases was still
higher in 1880—five persons to a family
and 6.6 persons to a dwelling—and has
declined steadily since.

The Census Bureau applies the term
"family" to a group of persons who are
related by blood or not, living together
in one household. One person living
alone is counted as a family, while the
occupants of a hotel or institution, re-
gardless of their number, are considered
one family. An entire apartment house,
although the home of many families,
constitutes only one dwelling in the Cen-
sus Bureau's classification.

As shown by the 1920 census, the av-
erage size of families was greatest in
the New England and middle Atlantic
states and smallest in western states.
The number of persons to a dwelling was
greatest in New England and middle
Atlantic states and smallest in western
states. Among individual states the
average was highest in 1920 ranged from
3.3 in Nevada to five in North Carolina,
and to a dwelling from 8.7 in Nevada to
7.2 in New York.
