Hum Sek Warned of 7 Year

At a meeting of the bills committee of the municipal council this morning bills recommended for drafting were considered and ordered printed and advertised. A proposed amendment of rates in the taxes act provoked considerable discussion and it was decided to make it obligatory for employers of labor to send in statements showing the number of persons employed and the amounts paid them, similar to that in vogue in the city. It also provided that every non-resident in parishes pay a tax of \$5 upon entering into employment, and that employers shall notify the assessors within twenty-four hours of the hire of strangers. They will also have to deduct a proportionate amount of taxes from their pay.
