GRACE LUSK, GUILTY, CHOKES PROSECUTOR

Spring at Him When Jury Announces Second Degree Murder Verdict

Carried From the Court—Slayer of Mrs. Roberts Will Get Prison Term of From 14 to 25 Years

Waukegan, Wis., June 1.—Grace Lusk was found guilty of second degree murder by the jury which tried her for killing Mrs. Mary Newman Roberts. When the verdict was delivered, Miss Lusk made an attempt to choke Special Prosecutor Tallar, but was overpowered by court attendants and led screaming from the court room. Second degree murder means fourteen to twenty-five years in prison.

Walter D. Corrigan for the prosecution, and James Clancy for the defense, delivered the closing arguments in the trial which began on May 18. Mr. Corrigan, in demanding the maximum penalty, declared that neither Dr. David Roberts nor Miss Lusk was on trial for their relationship, and that the only question to be decided was the responsibility for the death of an innocent woman.

Mr. Corrigan argued that the words and actions of the defendant proved her sane at the time of the shooting. He read the note she wrote immediately after the tragedy in which she said: "May God forgive me," and recalled her statement four days later to three witnesses that she realized what she had done, but could not understand how she did it so "calmly and deliberately."

Mr. Clancy cited stories told on the witness stand by both Miss Lusk and Dr. Roberts as the best proof that the defendant was insane, arguing that a woman of her admitted social and educational attainments would be incapable of the things revealed if she were sane. He referred to the mental faint in her family and nervous breakdown a little while before she met Dr. Roberts in 1915 as proving the testimony given by five alienists for the defense that she was suffering from paranoia.

Miss Lusk listened to the closing argument of the state with hardly a trace of emotion, but broke down completely after the case had gone to the jury, and sobbed in her father's arms.

FUNERALS TODAY.

The funeral of Dennis McDade of Lakeside took place this morning from his late residence to St. Alphonsus' church, Hampton, where high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. A. P. Allen. Interment was made in the Catholic cemetery in Hampton.

The funeral of Herman Sullivan will take place this afternoon from his late residence, Alexandra street. Services will be conducted by Rev. G. A. Kubring and interment to be made in Fernhill. Members of the Masonic fraternity and the Knights of Pythias will walk in a body.

VATICAN DID NOT KNOW OF MAN.

THE IRISH BISHOPS.
London, June 1.—According to the Daily Mail the Vatican has written to the Catholic Union disclaiming all knowledge of the Irish bishops' manifesto against conscription. The communication says that the Vatican knew nothing about the manifesto until eight days after its publication.

USE AEROPLANES IN FIRE PREVENTION WORK IN PROVINCE FORESTS

Before Ten Years, is Opinion of Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines — Recent Destructive Outbreaks

(Fredericton Gleaner)
The two forest fires the last week did damage to the extent of nearly \$60,000, according to figures presented at the Department of Lands and Mines today. The fire on the Sinclair limits, in Northumberland county, resulted in about \$40,000 of damage, which was principally to the supplies and warehouses of the Sinclair Lumber Company. The fire at Malaga Stream, between Kedgewick and Anderson, in Restigouche county, burned pulpwood and railway ties to the extent of about \$18,000.

The section in Restigouche county, where the fire broke out early in the week, is the most important Crown Land section in the province; and, if the fire had not been put under control, it would have been the most serious loss that ever happened to the Crown Lands of the province. It was in the vicinity of Gilmour and Hazen Settlements. The department yesterday appointed P. W. Tapley a special fire prevention officer to take charge of this section, and to remain on the ground during the year.

Two other caretakers are also there. Chief Forester Prince has returned after fighting the fire at Sinclair limits, forty miles from Doaktown. He left here on Saturday by automobile and, after driving all night and most of the next day, struck into the forest on Sunday night. They started in with one hundred men on Monday to fight the fire, and at about 11 o'clock the rain came on. This was a great aid in putting out the blaze. Ten men are now at the scene watching the area over which the fire swept. This area is about four miles long and of considerable width.

May Use Aeroplanes
Before ten years aeroplanes may be used by the Department of Lands and Mines in forest fire prevention work, according to an opinion expressed by Lieut.-Col. Leggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, today. Other forestry men say that aeroplanes will be used by the department long before that time, and only the war at present prevents their use. The forestry department of the province of Quebec has two in use at the present time, one of which is around the Three Rivers territory.

The aeroplanes which would be used by the forestry department would be of the hydroplane type, capable of traveling over trackless forests, making observations, and landing on the streams and lakes.

A Bathurst lumber concern is arranging to have a hydroplane built which will go over 80 miles into the forest around the lakes at the head of the Nepisiquit river. The machine will be able to take in several tons of provisions over a rough, porous road. Aeroplanes similar to those will probably be used by the forestry branch of the Lands and Mines Department in the near future.

RELEASE SIX THIS EVENING

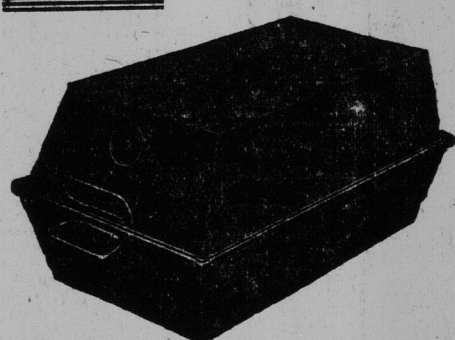

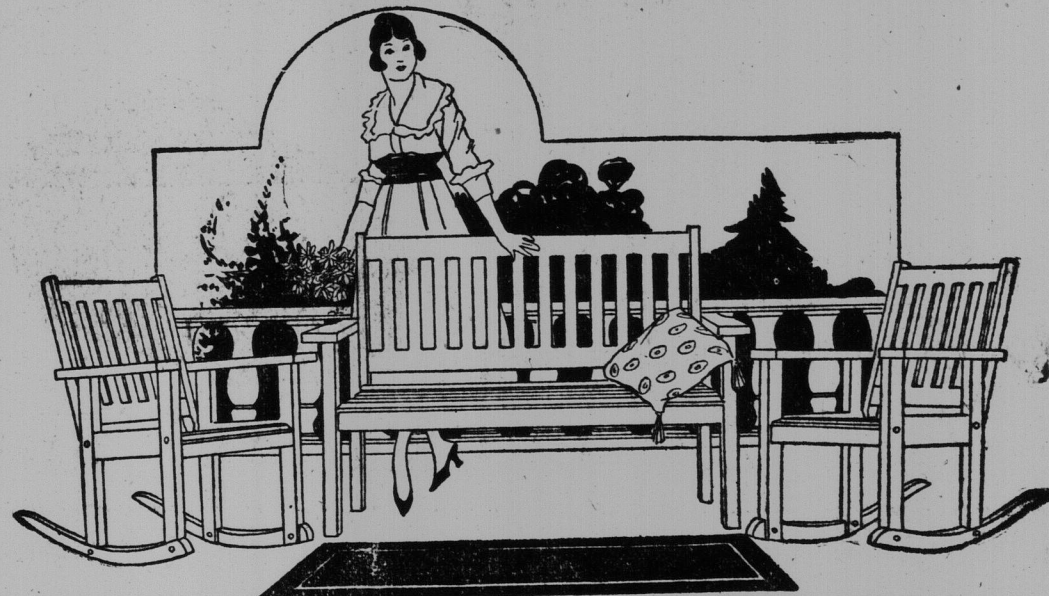
