TEMPERANCE MEN GIVE STRAIGHT DENIAL TO STANDARD STORY

Rev. Mr. Boyer and Another Official Speak of Last Night's Endorsement of Mr. Kierstead

In reporting the meeting of the St. John County Temperance Federation this morning the Standard again sacrificed truth to its desire for political effect. In its report the paper says that some of the temperance people at the meeting on indignation at the endorsement of Mr. Kierstead as candidate, left the hall.

Rev. H. R. Boyer, president of the federation said to The Times this morning in reference to the matter: "Mr. Kierstead was endorsed by the Temperance Federation. There was no feeling of dissatisfaction expressed by any present, but he received the hearty endorsement of the assembly. He was not endorsed because he was a Liberal or against the Conservatives, but because he stands for prohibition, irrespective of party."

Another officer of the federation who was present said the same as Mr. Boyer, and gave a flat denial to the Standard's report and added that not only was Mr. Kierstead endorsed by all, but that several members volunteered to take his nomination papers out and guaranteed to have them largely signed. He was also given personal endorsement by men of both political parties, men who have been party men all their lives.

MR. MCKEAN WINS

Judgment in Action Against A. E. Crandall — Other News of Courts

In the case of George McKean vs. A. E. Crandall, which was heard at the May sitting of the county court, Judge Jonah this morning gave judgment for the plaintiff for the full amount of the claim with costs. This was an action to recover \$186, the principal on a promissory note, and the defence argued that there was no consideration.

It was contended for the plaintiff that the title deed, which was to be the consideration, was by agreement, not to be given until the note was paid. Weldon & McLean appeared for the plaintiff, and Ralph St. John Freese for the defendant. In the summary judgment matter of Mrs. M. Grace Mullaly, landlady, vs. J. Major Howell, tenant, Judge Jonah this morning granted H. W. Robertson, for the plaintiff, an order for possession. Judgment was given about two weeks ago, and a stay of proceedings was granted of the defendant pending an appeal, but the bond on appeal was never filed and the time limit has now expired.

Circuit Court.

The adjourned sitting of the circuit court was this morning further adjourned a day to be named by Mr. Justice Landry. When the court meets then judgment will be given in the case Richmond Rochester vs. Miles E. Agar.

Fredricton Case.

Mr. Justice McLeod this morning gave judgment in the case of Mabel E. March vs. the Mail Publishing Company, awarding the plaintiff \$170 and costs. His honor reserved the point taken by the defendant's attorneys as to costs in connection with the plaintiff's admission by the plaintiff to the defendant, G. Earle Logan & Co., appeared this morning for Crockett & Guthrie for the plaintiff, and H. H. Pickett for McLean & Hughes for the defendant. This case was tried before Judge McLeod in Fredericton some time ago.
