## NEWFOUNDLAND Notice to Mariners

(No. 3, of 1915)

### JEANS HEAD, TRINITY BAY

**RIGHT ESTABLISHED**  
Lat. 47° 59' N.  
Lon. 53° 22' W.

**POSITION**—On Jeans Head, the Northern promontory of the entrance to New Perlican.

**DESCRIPTION**—An Occulting White, Dioptric Light, of the 4th Order.

**PERIODS**—Seven seconds light followed by three seconds eclipse, thus:

**RIGHT Eclipse** LIGHT Eclipse  
3 sec. 7 sec. 3 sec.

**ILLUMINATED ARC**—Visible in all directions seaward.

**ELEVATIONS**—Height of light from H. W. to focal plane, 159 1/2 feet. Height of tower from base to top of lantern, 27 1/2 feet.

**STRUCTURES**—The Station comprises an octagonal wooden tower with sloping sides, and Keeper's dwelling, a one-story flat-roofed building, connected to tower by a covered passage way.

**COLOR**—WHITE.

**REMARKS**—This light will be put in operation during month of September ensuing, without further notice.

"Ours" At The Dardanelles

An official message was received yesterday afternoon, saying that the Newfoundland regiment had left Alexandria on Tuesday last, September 14th, for the case at the Dardanelles. This is interpreted as meaning that our boys, while daily getting close to the firing line, will be first employed in maintaining communications and in routine duty, so that experienced soldiers may be released for the more active work. When, in a few weeks, or days, they are sufficiently acclimatized, and the big onward movement commences, it may be their honor and privilege to take a part in events which will be big with destiny.

It does not, however, necessarily follow that the peninsula of Gallipoli and the Turks will be the objective. There can be no doubt that the vast numbers of the soldiers of the Quadruple Entente now being concentrated in the vicinity of the Dardanelles and the Gulf of Saros, are there not only to join in the march to Constantinople, but to render service on the north coast of the Aegean Sea, if Bulgaria should prove mad enough and ungrateful enough to fight for the butchers of the fathers of her people. Be our lads' destination Bulgaria or Turkey, and their foes the Turks, the Bulgars or the Hun—they will quit themselves like men. They carry with them the prayers and pious and confidence of their loved Newfoundland. Daily News, Sept. 21.

## Important Events In the Near East

Rome, Sept. 20.—Active operations are likely soon to be underway along the frontiers of the Balkan States, the Tribuna declares. It learns from competent sources that an Austro-German movement has been planned for the latter part of October, a plan involving the expected diversion of 500,000 men from the Russian campaign to the Balkans with the simultaneous securing of Bulgaria's adherence in the move to open a route from Budapest to Constantinople.

The Tribuna and other journals argue the necessity of offsetting this move by concentration in the Dardanelles of all possible forces of the Entente Allies, declaring the issue turns on which side takes Constantinople, the Austro-Germans through Bulgaria, or the Allies through the Dardanelles.

## A Warning That Thrilled

Rev. Dr. Chapman, in one of his straight talks to 6,000 men in Melbourne, related the following incident:

"We had in the city of Philadelphia a man who was a secretary and treasurer of one of our great institutions. I suppose there is scarcely a man in this city that would equal him as a financier. Certainly not one who could surpass him. He was a great university man with all the fine instincts of a gentleman; but strong drink clinched him as its victim, and he went out of his place into a hovel not far from my church. When his little boy died, they had no clothing to put on the baby to make it ready for the grave. We furnished the clothes. Somebody said that, although the little child's feet were hidden by the dress, they were bare, and that we might put shoes upon the feet. I got some little white kid shoes and slipped them on the little feet. An old friend said, 'Get the father and bring him in. Maybe if he sees the baby he will come back to himself.' Clad in rags we brought the father in. He stood beside the little casket for a moment and looked down into the little face. Then he began to shake with great emotion. The tears just ran down his cheeks. The friends said to us, 'Leave him alone, and we went out and left him alone with his baby.' He stood there for a moment. Then he came up and clutched his throat and said, 'Drink, drink!' And he ran his fingers down over the folds of the little white dress and underneath and took off from those feet the little white kid shoes, and crumpled them in his pocket; and when I took his baby to the grave, he was insensible from drink from the price of the shoes which he had pawned. I see you shudder. Hear me, you men. There is not a man in this city that had stronger will power than my friend, dead and doomed as he is to-day. I tell you I have a right, this afternoon, to lift my voice against a sin that can take a man from his position and drag him to Hell; and I do it."

## A Challenge To the Outports

(Editor for Guardian).

Dear Sir,—The Twiligate Sun of recent date contained the following: "A visitor from St. John's said, 'I do not think from what I know and have seen that there will be any difficulty in getting a tremendous vote for prohibition in St. John's, but the publicans are depending on the indifference of the outports for their victory.'"

Mr. Editor, anyone who is following the situation closely knows that this is an exact summary of conditions. And, sir, such conditions are both a challenge and a shame. If, when St. John's citizens, abstainers and non-abstainers alike, are rousing themselves to destroy the evil, Prohibition is lost and the publicans win because of the indifference of the outports, it will make us partners with the liquor traffic, and jointly responsible for all its attendant crime, pauperism, disease and misery. Before the bar of individual conscience, of public opinion, of God Himself we shall stand convicted of a share in its evil.

The attitude of the publicans means a challenge to the outports. Shall we with craven hearts press the gauge of battle and allow them through our indifference to succeed, or shall we by our ballots make it plain to them that we will neither be partners of their iniquity nor passive servants of their will?

## Now Offering \$4.00 a Qtl.

The exporters and purchasers of fish on the Labrador coast have agreed to pay \$1.00 per qt. for fish. The market, so we understand, warrant a bigger price being paid. The supply will be far short of the demand. St. John's cannot supply all the demands made recently.

The buyers in agreeing to the price say they will not pay a cent more. It is now up to the fishermen to hold back their fish until the secure a higher price, \$1.70 a qt. at least.

It was conditions are affecting the price of other foodstuffs and commodities in general that the fisherman buys, he is unable to be able to get more for his fish. Bigger prices will be obtained before the end of November.
