**SPORTING MATTERS**  
**BRISON'S HORSES WON BOTH RACES YESTERDAY**  
Dr. Band Took the 2.18 Class Burling Getting One Heat and Domestic Captured the 2.35 Class in Straight Heats—Both Winners Were Driven by Leu Cox—1,300 People Present—Another Good Card for Today

The first day's races of the Moose path fair early September meet came off yesterday afternoon before about thirteen hundred spectators. The classes were the 2.18 and the 2.35.  
The former went to Domestic in three straight heats. In the second first money was captured by Dr. Band, which took the first, second and fourth heats. A. B. Kitchen's Burling cleverly given by Tom Holmes, took second money, beating Dr. Band in the third heat and getting second place in the fourth. Both of the winners are Yankee horses and are owned by M. L. Brison of West Newton, Mass. It was a great day for Leu Cox, who drove both Domestic and Dr. Band.  
The domestic officials were: Starter, J. S. McGivern; judges, N. A. Colter, J. T. Golding, S. A. McLeod; timers, W. H. Ford, T. H. Colter, Leon Keith; clerk of the course, J. H. Pallen. On the whole the officials handled the race in excellent style.  
There was, however, a mistake made by the judges in the first heat of the 2.35, which was afterward rectified. To add to the confusion the race the horses were a little slow in getting on the track.  
In the first heat of the 2.35 Gallagher who was driving Prince Alfonso, lost a tire on the first lap but kept on and finished in fifth place. In this heat Domestic took the lead at the first and kept it until the finish. For second place there was a lively struggle between Bella Donna and Little Don, the latter man winning out. The judges at first gave Little Don second place but on Dr. McAllister protesting and being supported by Holmes, Little Don's driver, the decision was reversed. The attitude of Holmes at this juncture gained him the applause of the spectators.  
In the second heat Cox with Domestic took the lead at first. Little Don who was doing well broke on the back stretch and dropped to fourth place. Prince Alfonso took second place and finished there with Bella Donna third. Prince Alfonso continued his good work and took second place in the next and final heat. As before Leu Cox with Domestic got the lead and kept it. Bella Donna again took third place.

**2.18 Class The Great Race**  
The 2.18 was a more interesting race than the other, the struggle between Dr. Band, winner, and Burling being close and exciting all the way through. Only three horses faced the starter—Burling, Dr. Band and Ada Mac. They got away on the third score. Dr. Band had the pole and took the lead. At the quarter Burling forged to the front, but at the half, Dr. Band had

each was keenly contested. Five heats were required to settle the 2.18 class. Feuchterina winning out after a dead heat with Kremella.  
In the 2.22 class, Major Wilkes took first money after Isard had won a heat.

There were only three heats in the 2.30 class, Belmont, the Chatham trotter taking it in three straight. The track was a little soft for fast work, but there were quarters in thirty-four, while the fastest mile was in 2:30. In every race there were some great drives and sensational finishes, the judges having difficulty several times to pick the winner.
