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



BURPEE-BURKBE-BURKEY. The first of the Burpee family in this country appears to have been Thomas, who settled at Rowley, Massachusetta. This town was fettled about 1639, and he bought a lot there immediately after the first settlement. The first time his name appears it is given as Thos. Burkby. Subsequently the town and parish clerks, in lists of taxpayers, par-ish records, etc., give it as Burkbee, Birk-bee, Birkbi and finally Burpee. In the rec-ords of births, etc., of Rowley the dates of births of children of Thomas and Martha Burkee, and of Thomas Burkbe, are given, 1665 and subsequently. In a list of taxpayers, 1691.
