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OFFICERS RETURN FROM "OVER THERE" WEARING MEDALS

A Number of Those Reaching Port Yesterday Have Been Honored by the King—The Majority Are Western Men.

Among the returned men to arrive in the city in St. John yesterday on the ocean liner which docked yesterday morning was Lieut.-Col. Bent of Toronto, who was awarded the D. O. for meritorious service on the western front. Colonel Bent enlisted in the 4th Battalion of Toronto and has seen much hard fighting in the British line. He sailed in a Highland regiment from the Queen city and went overseas with that unit in the early stages of the war, and up until a few weeks ago participated in every engagement in which the British line was engaged. Not having received any word of the whereabouts of his family, he is naturally anxious to learn of how they fared in the recent disaster. This is the second war that the Halifax officer has taken part in, having served in the South African war. He left yesterday for his home.

Captain Guy, who also returned yesterday, was the proud wearer of the Military Cross. He was a member of one of the finest units to leave Canada, the Strathcona Horse. He left last night for his home in Toronto on the C. P. R.

Second Lieut. W. Mason, of Wallace, Nova Scotia, has been returned to Canada on sick leave. He was attached to the Royal Flying Corps for the past eleven months.

Lieut. W. H. Stevens, of Vernon, B. C., of the Imperial Royal Engineers, who suffered from wounds received at Mesinas, was a member of the party which left last night for the west. He was injured in the leg and will likely be retained in Canada. As the result of observing from his machine the movements of a Hun Sub-Flight Lieut. Holmes, of Toronto, was the victim of a German attack and his machine brought down, although he fortunately escaped injury. He has been in the Royal Navy Aerial Service for the past two years. Other officers to return in the party were—Lieut. M. P. Shute, of Moncton, who is attached to the R. N. V. R.; Flight Lieut. Alver J. Gagner, of Moncton, who is attached to the R. N. V. R.; Lieut. W. H. Stephens, of St. John; Lieut. F. P. Clapperton, of Vancouver, who is a member of the R. F. C.

SENTENCED TO BE EXECUTED

Joseph Bolduc Killed Zoticque Bourdon of Longueil Last April.

Montreal, Jan. 24—Joseph Bolduc was convicted this afternoon at Sorel of the murder of Zoticque Bourdon of Longueil, an automobile dealer, in the woods near St. Guillaume on August 25 last and was sentenced to be hanged on April 15 next. The insanity plea set up for the defence fell to the ground as all witnesses testified that Bolduc was sane, though a degenerate. The jury deliberated on the question only ten or twelve minutes, and then unanimously agreed that Bolduc was responsible for his act and should suffer the full penalty.
