## Halifax Tells A Baseball Story

Mail Says St. John Manager Put One Over on Sister City Management.

Special to The Standard. Halifax, Sept. 5.—That the Halifax baseball players think they have a grievance is shown by the following which appears in today's Evening Mail:

Baseball managers are noted for their clean cut manner of doing business both at home and when in other towns and cities, but the same cannot be said for the management of the St. John team which played in Halifax in July. When the New Brunswickers asked for games here they were offered a guarantee of \$250 providing they could get a game in Moncton. They asked Moncton and proceeded to arrive in the city the manager wired asking Manager Willis to stage a third game to help them out in their expenses as the trip would cost close to \$200.

Mr. Willis went to a lot of trouble in getting his players together for a third game and added considerable expense to the club. Early on the morning of the first scheduled game the rain was falling heavily and the local players who offered to make good the guarantee felt sure that they would have to pay out money from their own pocket. However, they were ready but the weather turned out fine. Bumper crowds attended the morning and afternoon games. Shortly before the third game the manager of the St. John team informed Manager Willis that he would not place his team on the field unless the locals gave him a percentage of the first two games. To this the Halifax manager replied in the negative, denouncing the St. John manager as a hold-up man and his actions as "cheap."

The St. John man finally came through and put his team on the field. The New Brunswick manager with an innocent look on his face departed from the city, thanking the local management for their kindness. A few days ago Manager Willis was handed a bill for nearly \$20 from a local cafe the manager of which stated that the St. John manager told him to hand same over to the local manager for payment. Manager Willis was unable to understand why the St. Johner should eat at a high class cafe at the expense of the local club as the guarantee covered everything.

Manager Willis wrote the St. John manager who did not have the courtesy to answer, which leads the Halifaxians to believe him guilty of a piker's trick. The bill was paid but the St. John manager has gone down in the estimation of the local players. Halifax ball players pay their way wherever they go and no matter if they lose hundreds they would not leave town by putting over a cheap trick like that of the St. John man. The St. John players are not to blame as they are a fine lot of fellows but the manager evidently fooled even his own men.
