OBITUARY

William Alwood

The death is announced this morn-
ing of William Alwood in the 32nd
year of his age. The late Mr. Alwood
was a native of Hurlford, England, and
came to this city at the age of 24
in the employ of Lawton
and Vassie, drygoods, afterwards
spending several years in Boston in
the dry goods business. He returned
to St. John with the late Zebedee
Gebel, afterwards entering in partner-
ship as Estey and Alwood.

The late Mr. Alwood for many years
was active in church work with the
Brussels street Baptist church, and
was a deacon of that church for many
years. At his death he was senior
deacon of the Central Baptist Church.
He leaves two sons, Frank S., and
Zebedee G., and one daughter, Mrs.
Daniel Vaughan, all of this city.

His wife, Sarah Louise, daughter of
the late Zebedee Gebel, pre-deceased
him in 1907. Mr. Alwood enjoyed re-
markable health and vigor to the last,
and only within a few days was he
unable to take his customary walk
visiting friends and relatives. He was
respected and beloved by all and will
be much missed by many citizens. The
funeral will take place on Saturday
from the Central Baptist Church, ser-
vice at 2.30 o'clock.

Edward A. Stuart

Sydney, N. B., Nov. 20.—Word reach-
ed the city this morning of the death
of Professor Edward A. Stuart in New
York. The following telegram was re-
ceived by A. D. Gunn, K. G. B.:

"Professor Stuart died at midnight
in Knickerbocker Hospital this city,
November 18th, after being uncon-
scious thirty hours following apoplectic
stroke in a subway during rush hour."

Professor Stuart was born in Malindi,
Cochester county, about fifty-five
years ago. He came to Sydney from
Truro about seven years ago, and
while in the city was engaged in the
capacity of organist and choir leader
of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church.
The deceased had left some time ago
on a trip to the United States, where
he was visiting friends. He is sur-
vived by his sister in Windsor the wid-
ow of the late Archdeacon Martell.
There are also two brothers, who are
at present residing in Rhode Island.

Mrs. Isabel Riley

The death of Isabel, widow of An-
drew Riley, master builder of Annapo-
lis, N. S., occurred on Tuesday, at the
age of about eighty years. Deceased
is survived by three sons and two
daughters, namely, Thomas, in West-

DOMINION STEEL CO. SELLS STOCK TO BRITISH COMP.

Voted at Yesterday's Meeting
to Dispose of 50,000 Shares
—Declare Quarterly Divi-
dend.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—A meeting of the
Board of the Dominion Steel Corpora-
tion and its constituent companies took
place here this afternoon at which it
was decided that the Dominion Iron
and Steel Company will sell to a Lon-
don syndicate, composed of prominent
British financial and business men, fifty
thousand shares of the common stock
of the Dominion Steel Corporation.
This is to be new stock which the
iron and steel company will ac-
quire from the parent corporation, and
will not affect, in any manner, the fifty
thousand shares which are held by the
iron and steel company in its treas-
ury. The price to be paid is \$70 a
share. Closing price of Dominion Steel
Corporation common stock on the
Montreal Stock Exchange today was
75.

In giving out the above statement
President Workman pointed out that
the sale was a form of fostering closer
relations with the British.
Other business transacted at the
meeting was the authorization of the
payment of the quarterly dividend on
the Dominion Iron and Steel Company
preferred shares at the rate of seven
per cent, payable January 1 to share-
holders of record of December 31, and
the Dominion Steel Corporation com-
mon dividend at the rate of six per
cent payable January 1 to record of
December 31.
