## FRENCH TO QUIT AT GENEVA IF GERMANY COMES

**Millerand Instructs His Delegates to Leave "Bag and Baggage."**

**VIVIANI MAY BE  
THE NEXT PREMIER**

**Leygues' Ministry Not Expected  
to Last Long—Split on  
Vatican Issue Looked for.**

Paris, Nov. 17.—The departure for Geneva of the French plenipotentiaries—Leon Bourgeois, Gabriel Hanotaux and ex-Premier Viviani—to attend the opening of the assembly of the League of Nations, furnished a striking example of the fact that Alexandre Millerand has not only inaugurated a new role for the French president, but that he has become almost absolute in France.

It has been expected all along that France would furnish the heaviest opposition that might develop against the league program. I am now able to state that the drastic orders given the plenipotentiaries are that if there is any serious effort made to include Germany in the league they were to immediately quit Geneva "bag and baggage" and return home.

The French policy, therefore, still is to "wait and see" until it is definite that the United States will join the league. The administration intends to do, and for the moment, unless the German question does come to the fore, who will simply play the game with England. England wants the league and France does not, but as England's ally France feels she must keep her foreign policy in line with England's so long as America remains outside the combination.

Therefore, the choice of the three plenipotentiaries was well considered. B. Bourgeois was chosen naturally because he has headed the French section of the league as it exists today. M. Hanotaux was chosen because he is a member of the French

Academy—and for some reason or other the forty immortals are supposed to exercise a vast influence upon French political affairs. M. Viviani was chosen as number three because—according to the inner circle of the Quai d'Orsay—M. Viviani has been slated as the next premier of France.

Every Order to Elysee.

In the days of President Deschanel and the term of M. Poincare the Quai d'Orsay communicated with the Elysee by means of a semi-weekly dispatch case filled with prepared reports and documents carefully arranged for the presidential eye. Now this is all changed. M. Berthelot goes to the Elysee in person—not semi-weekly, but at most daily—and a presidential benediction is required for every ensuing order that emanates from the palatial Foreign Office on the banks of the Seine.

By making Leygues temporary premier, Millerand cleverly upset the plans of Aristide Briand, who headed the conspiracy to exalt him into the presidency and thus get rid of him with the intention of Briand then becoming the real chief of state in the role of premier. The presidential dossier on Briand is now such that it is scarcely likely the latter will ever hold power in France, while Millerand retains his faculties. However, it is considered necessary to get a new premier soon, and it is believed "strongly probable" that the presidential choice has fallen upon Viviani.

Likely to Fall On Vatican Issue.

It has not yet been officially decided upon just what question the Leygues ministry will be thrown overboard, but it is likely it will fall upon the vote for the re-establishment of the French embassy at the Vatican. Mr. Leygues' activities have been largely in the Senegal, which is reactionary on the subject, but M. Millerand is in control of the Chamber of Deputies, which, like himself, is strongly in favor of the re-establishment of church relations.

So considering the fact Viviani has again appeared on the horizon of active politics, it appears likely that the chamber—guided by Millerand—will wait until the League of Nations meeting is over and possibly even until the Christmas holidays before the real struggle is on. The situation must be settled before Easter when President Millerand will set forth in state to visit provinces in northern Africa to decide what role they must play in the economic and political future of France.

### Head Line

The usual winter service to Belfast and Dublin will be operated from St. John. The first sailing to Belfast will be the S.S. Farned Head, about the 20th December, and the next sailing will be early in January. For Dublin there will be a sailing about the 20th December, and the second sailing will be middle of January.

The Head Line are now also maintaining regular services to and from Canada to Rotterdam and Hamburg. There has been a monthly service from Montreal since the opening of navigation last May, and this will now be carried on from St. John during the winter.

The Farned Head will be the first boat of the line to arrive here from the Continent. She will have a full inward cargo from Rotterdam. This boat will be loading for Belfast. The first sailing from St. John for Rotterdam and Hamburg will be the Ramore Head, about the 25th December. A monthly sailing throughout the winter months will be maintained.

### SUGAR MARKET

New York, Nov. 18.—Raw sugar declines 14 cent early today under influence of London. There were sales of 3,700 bags of Surinam about at five cents off and 2,000 bags of Porto Rican at 6.25. No sales of Cuban were reported, but in the basis of business done, they were quoted at 5.25 cost and freight, equal to 6.25 for centrifugal.

There was a further decline in refined sugar to the basis of 9.50 for the granulated, a new low price for the season.

The easier feelings in raw and unfavorable Cuban reports led to renewed selling in futures, and at midday prices were 20 to 25 points lower.
