YEARLY INCREASE IN COST OF LIVING INDEX

Question No. 2,608-Mr. Robinson:

What was the increase per year in the cost of living index since its inception?

Hon. Jean-Luc Pepin (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): The Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports that: The yearly percentage change in the Consumer Price Index since 1913, is shown in the attached table. An explanation of the linking of the indexes to produce a continuous series is given below. The All-Items Consumer Price Index for Canada

Canada (1949=100)

The primary purpose of a consumer price index is the measurement of current price movements. Therefore, the items and their weights in the index should reflect the full range and relative importance of commodities and services bought by the population group to which the index relates. As the spending habits of the population change over time, the index based on a particular pattern of expenditure becomes a less and less reliable measure of price movement. For this reason major revisions of the index "basket" are made periodically. Such revisions break the continuity of the index and the separate indexes must be linked to provide an historical index.

The All-Items Consumer Price Index, from 1913 to date expressed in terms of 1949 = 100, incorporates five distinct series each covering part of the entire period. In each index the items and their weights are appropriate to the period covered by the specific index; i.e. each index relates to a particular "basket" of commodities and services.

The five indexes "linked" to produce one continuous series from 1913 to date are designated in the following table in terms of the period for which each constitutes the measure of price movement. The successive weight base periods are also indicated. The beginning and ending months of each index are specific link dates.
