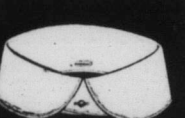

District and General.

Wm. Luke, of Bothwell, had 30 sheep killed by dogs.

There are 95 pupils enrolled at the Toronto Aviation School.

Mrs. Andrews, of Iona Station, died Friday in her 94th year.

Canada's postal receipts for June show an increase of \$1,250,000.

The Young Ladies' Patriotic Society of Watford raised \$138 from a "tag day."

A few days' campaign at Wallaceburg raised \$28,000 for patriotic purposes.

The moving picture shows at Alvinston have been discontinued owing to lack of patronage.

The youngest daughter of Thomas Brown, of Middlemiss, died last week from whooping cough.

Miss McPherson, of Campbellton, has been hired to teach at Fy's School, North Howard.

Killian Dill, of North Aldborough, died at his home, con. 1, Wednesday. He was in his 63rd year.

A Bayham township farmer was fined \$30 and costs for sending deteriorated milk to a cheese factory.

Wardville Women's Institute will hold their annual picnic on Friday, July 23rd, in Henderson's grove.

Total Canadian casualties are now 10,188, of which the killed number 1,749, wounded 8,574, and missing 1,865.

George Carr, aged 53, a wealthy Enniskillen township farmer, dropped dead on his farm Monday from heart failure.

Miss Lizzie Outhouse, aged sixty-six, trained nurse, of Bothwell, died in Michigan, and her remains were interred at her old home.

Before closing school for vacation Miss Olive Sterling, teacher at Fy's, North Howard, was presented with an address and a purse of money.

The Ford Motor Co., of Detroit, is refunding approximately \$15,000,000 to Ford purchasers during the past year. Payment will be made August 1.

The British war loan, the greatest in the history of the world, amounting to over \$3,000,000,000, was loaned the Government inside of three weeks.

St. Marys ratepayers will pay a tax rate this year of 32 mills. The war has cost the town three mills, and the public schools three more than usual.

The hydro bylaw was passed by Petrolia ratepayers. The vote stood 385 for the bylaw and 10 against. The town will use 500 horsepower and pay \$90,000 a year.

George Winters, a Bothwell widower, tried to kill three of his children with poisoned candy, having first tested it on the dog, which died; then he took a dose himself.

A peach grower of Arkona, Lambton county, said the other day that he would have at least 3,000 bushels of peaches to market this fall. Arkona is the centre of a great fruit belt.

The hog cholera epidemic in West Elgin has spread to Delaware township. The inspectors ordered over 70 hogs killed on one farm, the loss to the farmer being in the neighborhood of \$500.

Bruce Watterworth, aged 5, son of a farmer living near Ridgeway, was almost instantly killed Monday evening, when he fell under a wagon loaded with hay, which was being driven from the fields to the barn.

The United States will be "enormously wealthy" if the European war continues six months longer, says Edward M. Hurley, vice-chairman of the federal trade commission, in announcing the plans of the commission to promote foreign trade.

The hotelkeepers of St. Marys have printed notices out now, since the carrying of the Temperance Act, raising the price of meals to 40 cents. The price of stabling is also raised, and there will be no more free sheds for horses. Single horses in shed will be charged five cents.

A severe electrical storm, accompanied by wind and hail, passed over Camlachie and vicinity Friday afternoon. Fences and trees were blown over and grain beaten to the ground.

Mrs. H. Paris's barn was struck by lightning and badly damaged and one of her horses were killed.

John Stuart, of Muncey, has received word that his nephew, Pte. Jarius Maus, of the 16th Battalion, who had a leg shot away in the battle of Langemarck, is likely to have to undergo the amputation of his right arm as well. Pte. Maus is now in a hospital in Lincoln, England.

The official opening will be made today of the London and Port Stanley Railway, the first hydro radial line in the province. Some 500 delegates from municipalities all over Ontario are expected. Among those who will deliver addresses at the function will be Premier Hearn, J. L. Englehart, Sir Adam Beck and J. W. Lyons.

A big Packard car driven at high speed plunged over an embankment on the Pipe Line road near London early Saturday morning, killing Mrs. W. H. Kemp and seriously injuring Miss Margaret Wright and Percy Foster. Harold Saylor, the other occupant of the car, escaped unhurt. All were London people and had, it is said, been spending the night joy riding.

Sweet clover, so long regarded as a weed in some sections of the province as fodder, and is now being investigated at the Ontario Agricultural College.

FARMERS ARE WARNED

That Ontario farmers may be protected, the Toronto police have made public the details of a huge swindle perpetrated by a man who made that city his headquarters until a week ago, when he vanished. Against the mass scores of complaints have been registered by Ontario farmers. Thousands of dollars are involved in the swindle.

The man, under the name of Kelly, opened a business at 224 King street east some four weeks ago, according to the police. He sent out six agents on motor cycles to purchase produce to be paid for on delivery at Toronto. The agents, according to the police, were instructed to meet the farmer as to prices. In some cases they dealt directly with the farmer, and in other instances worked through village and town stores.

The goods were obtained from the express companies and freight offices by a man who signed the name of Smith.

Chief Constable Grassett warns Ontario farmers against answering advertisements inserted in daily papers by strangers regarding the purchase of their produce and cautions them not to do business with men of whom they know nothing.

Motorcycle Scared Horse.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Towers, of Ekfrid, were seriously injured in a runaway on Tuesday evening. They were driving to Glencoe and on the town line north of the C. P. R. their horse took fright at a motorcycle and overturned the buggy. Mr. Towers was severely bruised and had his head cut badly above the ear. Mrs. Towers was internally injured and had several ribs broken. The harness broke, allowing the horse to get free from the buggy, which was not greatly damaged, nor was the horse injured. Mr. and Mrs. Towers are not thought to be in danger from their hurts.

Ridgetown Lad Killed.

Ridgetown, July 21.—A sad accident happened shortly after eight o'clock last night on the farm of Watterworth Bros., just outside the town limits, by which Bruce, the five-year-old son of W. D. Watterworth, lost his life.

The men were engaged in drawing hay and were just starting for the barn when, unnoticed by them, the little fellow clapped the side of the track and fell under the wagon, the hind wheel passing over his body.

He was picked up alive, but passed away before the house was reached.

Field Crop Awards.

Awards in the field crop competition conducted in connection with the Moss and Ekfrid Agricultural Society, in which wheat was the crop selected, have been made as follows:—1st, Wm. Reynolds; 2nd, Hugh McCullum; 3rd, Wm. McCutcheon; 4th, N. J. McKellar; 5th, John Gould; 6th, Abraham Burchiel; 7th, Jas. McKee.

The first five are eligible to compete in the sheaf and grain competition at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto.

Soldiers Will Help Farmers.

A harvesting furlough of one month will be granted to all non-commissioned officers and men of the 33rd and 34th Battalions, and the 2nd Battalion, now in camp at London, who care to help take off the crop of grain the farmers within a radius of 30 miles of London will harvest this season. From what could be learned, after the men had become acquainted of the order many of them will take advantage of the opportunity and go into the country and spend four weeks picking sheaves. They will receive their regimental pay while doing this work, and will also be paid by the various farmers who employ their services.

Onion Growers Alarmed.

The onion growers are somewhat alarmed at what they believe is a pest that threatens to destroy their crop. Never before did their fields look more promising and never was their expectations higher. But in the last few days a change seems to have come over the crop and it seems to be attacked by what they call curl probably for no other reason but that the plant seems to curl and wilt away. Some have investigated and say they found a small yellow fly to which they ascribe the mischief. Whatever is the reason the crop appears to be withering away, whole fields are effected and if conditions do not improve there will be a great loss.—Ridgetown Plaindealer.

And Canadians are Greeted in Way That Makes Them Proud.

His old friends and schoolmates in S. S. No. 9, Moss, recently forwarded a \$10 gold piece to Pte. George M. Second, of the Third Field Ambulance Corps, now on active service in France. In acknowledging the gift, Pte. Second writes from France under date of June 29 as follows:—

My Dear Friends and Neighbors,—It is with no little pleasure and a feeling of gratitude that I write you these few lines. I cannot tell you what a surprise I had on receiving your letter and finding such a valuable remembrance. Words cannot express my feelings towards you, for I value it more than you can imagine. I feel very proud of it, for anything from or with Canada on it is almost beyond value over here. It is nice to know that my old friends and schoolmates still remember me. It is also nice to realize that our good friends back home are so thoughtful, and in so many different ways doing their part to make our time pass quickly and make us as happy as possible during our many trials.

I do not think that a good many realize fully what is taking place over here, but you would be surprised if you were to drop into our camp and see the good spirits of the boys. There are many hundreds who now have been laid low and many more who will never again see our old Canadian shores, but they all take it as a matter of course, and through all that I have been I have never heard a soldier murmur or complain.

When you get back a few miles from the firing line you would hardly know there was a war on except for the roar of the cannon, and the many motor lorries which are playing such an important part in this world war. So it goes to show the great confidence placed in our soldiers by the civil population of France and Belgium. At the time when the Canadians played such an important part in the second battle of Ypres and when Ypres was being levelled to the ground, numbers of the civil population still remained and many who clung to their old homes were killed, so one could hardly believe how fearless they are.

We have been practically all along the entire British front, and everywhere we go the boys have made good and are always greeted in a way that makes one proud that he is a Canadian and fighting for a cause that is sure to win. But our great desire is for the war to cease and to be back once more in Canada with our so many proud friends.

I would like to write to you one and all, but if you were here now and saw the difficulties under which I am writing this letter—with a candle for a light, a rubber sheet overhead and it raining outside—you would excuse me, I know; so I will send this to my brother and leave it to him to see that you all know that I received your gift and in simple words receive my thanks.

Though sea and land divide us, And we are miles apart, I'll always think of "homeland" And the way you did our part. Many could not send their dear ones, But in other ways have done Their little bit to help us. This great war to win, So, until again we meet, Which I hope will not be long, I still will hold you true to me. And, now, will say, "So long."
