- D. Comment by Mr. Mackenzie King on F/M Smuts' remarks:
 - 1) Question whether it would not be best to have a Commonwealth defence policy with allocation of specific liabilities was a recurrent one;

suggestions on this subject had been made as early as 1923 and again in 1926;

opposition from Dominions arose from political considerations which no government among them could overlook, even if there were military and financial advantages in such a Commonwealth system as was suggested.

2) The surest way to win the support of the Commonwealth Governments was to trust them to accept the obligations which they believed to be natural and right;

experience of the war had proved this point; a highlycentralized policy might have had a very different response from the Dominions;

if ever liberty were at stake, they could be trusted to respond wholeheartedly.

3) He believed in the closest co-ordination and closest understanding which would be achieved; but he was not in favour of reversing the tendencies of the last 20 years.
