MEETING OF EASTER VESTRY

Maple City Episcopalean Churches Hold Annual Gatherings Last Night.

Splendid Response of Holy Trinity Church—Good Record of Christ Church.

The Easter vestry meeting of Holy Trinity, held in the school room, was well attended by representative members of the parish.

The rector expressed himself as exceedingly pleased with the reception that he had received from the congregation and with the prospects before him in taking charge of the parish. He also expressed gratification at the response made to the Warden's appeal for a liberal offering on Easter day, the sum realized being considerably more than what was asked for.

The financial report for the year was received.

The rector appointed Mr. W. T. Shannon as his Warden and the people elected Mr. E. Bell as theirs.

Mr. Coate was re-elected Vestry Clerk.

The Advisory Board elected were Messrs. C. E. Beaton, Wm. Ball, W. J. Moore, C. D. Williamson, T. Scullard, F. Goodland, N. H. Stevens, W. R. Baxter, P. S. Coate, H. J. Stevens, Dr. Musson, Dr. R. V. Bray, Geo. A. Sayer and S. Sly.

The meeting was adjourned until May 8th to receive the report of the auditors.

CHRIST CHURCH.

The annual vestry meeting of Christ Church was held last night. The attendance was very good. The rector, Rev. Rural Dean McCosh, presided and opened the meeting with prayer.

The rector made a short address, in which he spoke of the progress and prosperity of the Church. He thanked the members for their sympathy and support and their generous provision for the maintenance of the Church.

The minutes of the last Easter vestry meeting having been read and adopted, the rector then asked the wardens to present their financial report.

Mr. J. Waddell, the people's warden, then read the financial report, which proved to be one of the best in the history of the church. The report showed that the fixed expenditures of the church had been met, and some special expenditures, and the whole of the floating indebtedness provided for out of the income of the church, leaving a surplus of between two and three hundred dollars.

Messrs. O. L. Lewis, Henry Dennis and others spoke of the excellent work being done by the church, the attractiveness of the services and the large congregations.

Mr. W. E. Rispin, the rector's warden, in seconding the motion that the financial report be received and referred to the auditors, spoke of the prosperous condition of the church, and urged the universal adoption of the envelope system, which experience had proved to be the safest and surest. He said that loose, unpledged offerings were variable and uncertain.

The rector appointed Mr. Rispin his warden and in doing so spoke of the heavy duties which fell to the wardens last year, occasioned by the alterations and improvements, and heartily thanked them for their noble work. Mr. John Waddell was re-appointed the people's warden.

Messrs. Heyward, Head, Barassin, Lewis, Richards, Shackleton, Smith, Bennett, Dr. Holmes, Richardson, Harper, Thomas, Kenny, Weir, Weir, Dennis, Falls, Dunlop, Morton and Woodward, Charles Kellar and S. Stephenson were re-elected members of the Advisory Board.

The following sidesmen were elected:—

Messrs. Thornton and Dunlop were elected auditors.

The usual appropriations were made for the salaries of Sexton and Vestry Clerk.

Quite an interesting discussion took place, touching the musical services of the church and the marked improvement since the introduction of the vestry choir. The rector, wardens and all present felt that everything should be done to keep up the efficiency of the choir and maintain a bright attractive service. Seven hundred dollars was the appropriation set apart for the choir and music.

Messrs. Rispin and Harper were re-elected Glebe committee.

A vote of thanks was passed to Rev. W. H. G. Colles for his kindly assistance to the rector, more especially in connection with Sunday services. The rector spoke very gratefully of Mr. Colles' services.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the Senior and Junior Guilds for the splendid work which they have done and are doing.
