OCTOBER 27 IN MUSKOKA AND SAULT STE. MARIE.

Date For North Renfrew Not Yet Pixed, but Will be Shortly After the Others-Standing of the Par-

Toronto, Oct. 6. - The byeelections in Sault Ste. Marie and Muskoka will be held on the 27th of the present month, with nominations on the 20th. This was decided yesterday at a meeting of the Cabinet. The date of the bye-election in North Renfrew was not settled, but it will be fixed for a date shortly after the

fixed for a date shortly after the others.

In Muskoka, which was rendered vacant by the death of the Liberal member, Dr. Samuel Bridgland, the Liberal candidate will be Dr. Hart of Bracebridge, and the Conservative Dr. A. A. Mahaffy, who was deleased by Dr. Bridgland by 86.

The present standing of the party gives the Liberals 50, including the Speaker, and the Conservatives 45. If both the seats go in favor of the Government the standing will be 52 to 45, making the majority 7. If both go against them the majority would be reduced to three, including the Speaker.

BECAUSE OF STRIKERS.

Morse Iron Works Closed Down Indefinitely.

New York, Oct, 6 .- Labor difficulties are responsible for the closing down indefinitely of the Morse Iron Works are responsible for the closing down indefinitely of the Morse Iron Works and Dry-dock Company in Brooklyn, one of the largest concerns of its kind on the Atlantic coast. President Edward P. Morse says:—"Last year we were working on contracts of more than \$1,000,000, employing about 2.200 men, and with a weekly pay-roil of \$22,000. Strikes began as soon as the unions discovered our yard was full of work and that we were bound under a penalty to complete our contracts on time. Had they planned to ruin our concern they could not have worked more systematically."

The troubles, he added, began when the employees demanded and the company consented to the dismissal of a foreman who had discharged thirty men for idleness. From that time it had been one continuous succession of strikes, the last being that of the machinists, which is still on.
