BY AIR AND ELECTRICITY. ew Method of Signalling Adopted Parts of England-Pewer Supplied Direct to Points Required.

system of electro-pneumatic sigalling has been installed by the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company at the new Bolton station, now approaching completion.

The system employed depends for its action upon a combination of air and electricity. The points and sig-nals, instead of being operated by means of rods and wires, necessitat-ing considerable manual power, are is connected to each pair of points and each signal.

and each signal.

The motors are driven by compressed air at a pressure of about 70 pounds per square inch, and are placed in all cases as close as possible to the points or signals which they op-

erate.
Each cylinder is provided with valves to control the inlets from the air main, and these valves are opened and closed by means of electroed and closed by means of electromagnets actuated by electric currents from the signal-box. Thus the power is applied directly at the point at which its services are required, and is subject to the central control of the signalman. This control is exercised by means of a frame of miniature levers.

Ample measures are provided by means of auxiliary electrical circuits to guard against, a signal being lowered unless the points which it controls are actually in their correct position, and in the case of facing

towered unless the points which it controls are actually in their correct position, and in the case of facing points to ensure that they are also securely bolted in that position.

An ingenious feature is what is known as the "check-locking" arrangement. This ensures that until the movement of a point or signal has been fully completed the lever in the signal-box which is concerned is checked when about three-quarters of its stroke is accomplished.

As soon as the signal or point movement, as the case may be, is properly completed, the "check-lock" is electrically removed and the signal malman is enabled to pull the lever fully over. Until he has done so the mechanical locking in the frame prevents the movement of any contingent point or signal levers, which are thus held locked, until the movement of any necessary points has actually heen comoleted.

NEW PAVEMENT

Residents of Victoria Ave. Meet and Decide Definitely upon one-a Unanimous

It was then agreed to petition the Council for a pavement 24 ft. over all on Victoria Ave. from Thames St. to Gladstome Avenue, the pavement to be either vitrified brick of asphalt block, the kind to be decided by a majority of the ratepayers. All present signed the petition and it is thought that a sulficient number of signatures can be secured to insure the laying of a pavement. be secured to insure the faying of
