

THE START IN THE EVOLUTION OF THE COLD AIR POULTRY HOUSE

Open-fronted, cold air poultry houses were not considered practicable for the cold winter climate of Quebec when Brother Ligouri, of La Trappe Monastery, erected the modest edifice to be seen in the background of the illustration. Fearing the ridicule of his friends, Brother Ligouri erected this, the first cold air poultry house in his province, in an out-of-the-way spot. His first model as here shown has since undergone many changes, but the principle of fresh air in poultry houses, has found almost universal adoption among progressive poultry keepers; it seems to matter little to the birds how cold it gets provided other conditions about the house are right.
