NEW WAGE SCHEME Raise 1914 Scale by 20 Per

Cent.-Suggest Arbitration to Fix Terms

LONDON June 15 --- British min rs today voted on the proposals of the mine owners for a settlement of the coal diggers' strike which has been in progress since April 1st. All. coal fields in the United Kingdom were affected by the decision to ballot on the acceptance or repection of the mine owners' terms; and the question was placed before the miners without recommendations from the conference of delegates which met here June 10.

The result will be announced on Friday. The owners' final proposals include the establishment of a new standard minimum wage by raising the 1914 scale by twenty per cent. The owners suggested as an alternative that the new wage standard be settled by a national wage


