

Fishery West

The report received by the Board of Trade from T. Soper of Channel gives the total catch up to May 15th as 5624 qtls. of codfish and 22,800 pounds of halibut with 30 qtls. and 800 pounds respectively for the week just ended. Four small schooners returned from the grounds with about 40 qtls. each. Prospects were then very poor, bait being scarce, as was also salmon. The winter fishery was practically over and a few of the larger boats were fitting out for the Straits while others had abandoned the voyage
