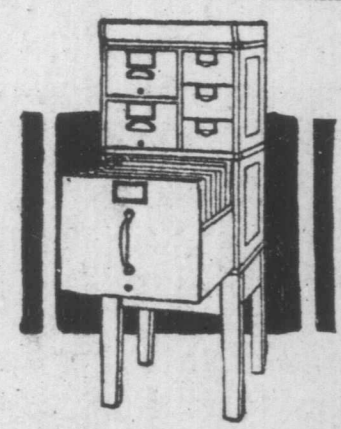

**The Dredge**

The Priestman, Capt. Bartlett finished dredging operations Saturday at Barr's Cove which had again become filled, though cleared out last season, through a nearby wharf collapsing and allowing the silt to wash in. The material removed was of such a nature that most of the crew were sickened by the stench. Some 900 tons were taken out. The dredge has done excellent work since resuming operations after the winter having cleaned out Monro's, Baine Johnston's & Co.'s and Barr's Coves within a few weeks. It is likely she will next be engaged near Franklin and Co's.

**Fishery West**

The report received by the Board of Trade from T. Soper of Chapel gives the total catch up to May 15th as 5624 qtls. of codfish and 22,800 pounds of halibut with 30 qtls. and 800 pounds respectively for the week just ended. Four small schooners returned from the grounds with about 40 qtls. each. Prospects were then very poor, bait being scarce, as was also salmon. The winter fishery was practically over and a few of the larger boats were fitting out for the Straits while others had abandoned the voyage.

**The Collegians Football Club**

A meeting of the Collegian Football Club was held Friday evening, when the plans for 1915 season were decided upon. Mr. Herb. Barnes was elected Captain and Mr. H. Piko Sub-Captain for the ensuing year, H. Bastow was elected Secretary-Treasurer and League Delegate. A number of members attended and displayed keen interest in the game. It was decided to retain football at all costs in remembrance of the absent members.
