STIRRING UP MORE TROUBLE

Bankers in U. S. Protest Against Britain Seizing Securities.

By Special Wire to the Courier.
New York, Feb. 17.—A meeting of bankers, dealers in bonds and members of the Stock Exchange, who have been embarrassed by British and French seizures of security shipments from Germany and Holland to this country was held today to decide whether to make a concerted protest to the state department in Washington. Some of the banks and bankers already have made individual protests. Among them are the Guaranty Trust Company and the Equitable Trust Company.
It was learned today that the British and French authorities have seized not only stocks and bonds, bearing German stamps or names sent here from Holland and other neutral countries, but have held up bills of exchange involving many millions of dollars on goods consigned to neutral European countries. It is asserted that French agents have seized cotton shipments to Switzerland and Holland, while Great Britain has held up the bills of lading and exchange on the same goods.

GREAT GALE SWEEPS FRANCE

Many Shipwrecks and Channel Services Delayed and Stopped.

Paris, Feb. 17.—A gale swept France yesterday and caused serious damage in Paris and in the provinces. A number of shipwrecks have been reported from the maritime districts and the channel services have been delayed and at some ports entirely interrupted. Many telegraph wires and many trees have been blown down and several persons were killed and injured in Paris by falling tiles and chimneys. In the Charente district, a local torrent broke its banks and flooded the plains lying below. Reports from the front describe the weather for the last 48 hours, as the worst experienced since the war began. The gale was particularly severe in the Belgian district, where roofs were blown off the houses, trees uprooted and many persons injured and where a large section of territory was flooded.

The Vienna police being of the opinion that pedestrians are chiefly to blame for street accidents, have issued a notice to the effect that a pedestrian, if he wishes to cross the road, must do so in a direct line, taking the shortest path.

WHY ARE YOU NEED

ONCE MORE WARNING TO AMERICANS, NO ON VESSELS AGR

Editor of the "Fatherland" ed Passengers Before Sunk, Sends Telegramic Daily, Telling Faces a Real Crisis.

By Special Wire to the Courier.
Chicago, Feb. 18.—Despatch to the Montreal Gazette—Under the heading "New Sea Horror Seen by Viereck," the Chicago Evening Post yesterday printed the following:

"Warning of Germany's likelihood of sinking another big passenger liner without warning, regarding the consequences to those on board, whether they be Americans, Englishmen or citizens of any other nation, was received at the office of The Post editor of The Fatherland, official organ of the central powers in the United States."

GAVE WARNING OF LUSTANIA
"Mr. Viereck circulated a similar warning just prior to the sailing of the Lusitania in its ill-fated voyage. After that vessel was sunk and during the protracted and sometimes heated negotiations regarding it, Mr. Viereck insisted there was no Lusitania crisis, but now he admits that the United States is facing a real crisis which may lead to disastrous consequences unless this government summons the aid of the United States."

"The United States is facing to-day the gravest crisis that has confronted us in the present war. Whenever newspapers in the country proclaim that our negotiations with Germany were at the most critical stage, with war at arms length, the Fatherland declared that there was no Lusitania crisis. Events have proved that the Fatherland was right. To-day we declare with equal emphasis that there is danger ahead."

GERMANS DO NOT "BLUFF"
"The central powers have declared that, beginning with the first of March, armed merchantmen will be treated as warships. We may be willing to eat our own words and to resign on the subject of submarine warfare. We cannot expect Germany to do likewise. Poker is not the German national game. The Germans are not a nation of bluffers."

"Unless our government issues an immediate warning against travel on belligerent vessels—we shall have to face in another couple of weeks the serious situation that a vessel carry-

ing American passengers would be sunk."
