In election for constitutional prohibition in Iowa

Des Moines, Iowa, Oct. 16—Returns today from more than two-thirds of the precincts of the State on election of constitutional prohibition, held in Iowa yesterday, indicate that the amendment for bidding the manufacture and the sale of liquor was adopted by a majority of about ten thousand.

Prohibition by statute prevails in Iowa at present.
