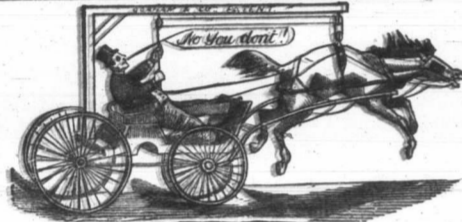

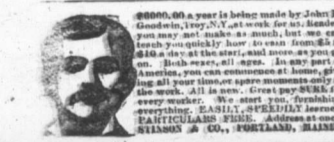

LOCAL SUMMARY.

ATHENS AND NEIGHBORING LOCALITIES FEBRUARY 8, 1891.

Wm. Gray came near being a team through the ice on Delta Lake last week.

Mr. A. Bell, Delta, is preparing to build a new house on his farm near the village.

The Roman Catholics of Phillipsville are preparing to build a vault near their church.

Another lot of those cheap Dime Bibles, just issued, at Chris Hall, Brockville, by G. W. Downey.

As the result of recent tests, it is claimed that Manitoba milk is richer than the milk of Eastern Ontario.

Rescue Division, Phillipsville, will hold a series of penny readings in their lecture rooms commencing on Friday next at 8 o'clock.

The Smiths Falls council have laid before the people of that town a law fixing the amount of hotel license at \$300 in excess of all government duties. Waiting at the by-law will take place on Feb. 23.

The town clerk of Espanville made a great and good man. His salary is \$30 a year, and yet he lives among the people like one of them, avoiding all ostentatious display of dress, equipage, etc., to which the rich of the earth are too prone. Ditto Athens.

Mr. H. Eaton, who has successfully taught the common school in Elgin for the past three years has secured his connection with that school and will enter the Athens High school this week in order to prepare himself for a 2nd class examination in July next.

The annual missionary meeting in connection with the mission work of the Diocese of Ontario, will be held in Christ-church, Athens, on Wednesday (to-morrow) evening, at half past seven o'clock. Addresses will be delivered by Rev. T. Garret, M. A., of St. Luke's church, Ottawa, and Rev. T. Austin-Smith, S. A. C., of Ashton.

The public are respectfully invited. Meetings will also be held at Lansdown on Thursday and at Delta on Friday at the same hour.
